Poles Capture Smolensk

LONDON, Feb. 10.—Polish forces of the Russian army, led by General Doybor and General Mousnitsky, captured Smolensk from the Bolsheviks, according to an Exchange Telegraph report from Vienna via Copenhagen.

American Artillery Man Killed

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Feb. 10.—One American artilleryman was killed and five wounded Saturday night by shell fire. The Americans were sending shrapnel into the enemy trenches in reply all day. Considerable patrol work was done, but there were no further clashes.

MAKING ARRANGEMENTS TO MOVE CORN CROPS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—To facilitate the speedy movement of soft corn, the grain board of the Department of Agriculture today undertook an immediate survey of the situation throughout the corn producing belt. Recommendations for the placing of the cars will be made to the director-general of railroads as soon as the survey is completed, probably within the next four or five days.

GOVERNOR'S SON SERIOUSLY ILL

SALEM, Feb. 10.—Governor Withycombe today received news that the condition of his son Earl, sergeant in the engineers, was grave. He has been ill at Walter Reed hospital, Washington, D. C., for three weeks, with measles.

MYSTERIOUS FIRE IN NEWARK FREIGHT SHED

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 9.—Fire of suspicious origin broke out early today in the Lehigh Valley freight transfer station. The blaze spread to twenty freight cars filled with merchandise. One of the burning cars broke away and slid down to the bridge, setting it on fire. Firemen were handicapped by scarcity of water. The freight station is a wooden building 1000 feet long.

TRANSPORTS CAN BE MADE UNSINKABLE

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Means have been found to make troop transports unsinkable by submarines, according to a statement made tonight by William L. Saunders, vice-chairman of the Naval Consulting Board, in an address at a dinner of the University of Pennsylvania alumni in this city.

Saunders said one of the ships recently commandeered by the government "now lies at an Atlantic port and in such shape that she cannot be sunk by an exploding torpedo."

MAY MEAN WAR ON BOLSHEVIKI

ZURICH, Switzerland, Feb. 10.—The separate peace with UCRANIA is equivalent to a declaration of war against the Bolsheviks of Russia, is the comment of the Zurich Zeitung newspaper, which doubts whether UCRANIA is in a position to conclude an effective peace.

TUSCANIA SOLDIERS DEPART

BELFAST, Ireland, Feb. 10.—Part of the American rescued from the Tuscania disaster took their farewell today and entrained south. The departure of the Americans was not generally known or the crowd that cheered them on their departure would have been many times larger.

NO CHANGE ON BRITISH-ITALIAN FRONT

LONDON, Feb. 9.—An official statement on British operations in Italy, issued today, says:

"The British front is unchanged. There has been successful counter battery work. There was considerable aerial activity the past week. Fifteen enemy machines were shot down and another was brought down out of control. One balloon was burned. We lost one machine."
