Five American Soldiers Reported Killed in Ambush By Germans

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE. (By Associated Press.)—Five American soldiers are believed to have been killed Saturday night, and four are reported missing and one was wounded when an American patroling party was ambushed by a superior force of Germans in No Man's Land. The spot where the encounter occurred is isolated and reports by both sides are meagre. Only one American in the party is known to have escaped from the trap which was laid in front of our wires. The one survivor crawled back with a bullet in his chest, unable to talk.

Our artillery immediately laid a barrage around the ambushing Germans and some of them are believed to have been accounted for. The infantry is believed to have accounted for others, and it is certain that the patrol party fought to a finish, according to information trickling in from the front lines.

Draft Evaders Kill Three Officers

SAFFORD, Ariz., Feb. 10.—Sheriff R. F. McBride, Deputy Marshall M. B. Kempton and Kane Wootan were killed today by Tom and John Powers, alleged draft evaders, in the mountains 25 miles northeast of Klondike, Arizona. Deputy United States Marshal Haynes, the only survivor in the party, returned to Haynes this afternoon at 4 o'clock. Powers from Thatcher, Safford and Globe have gone out to hunt the Powers brothers and an outlaw named Tom Sisson.

Colonel Roosevelt Is Improving

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Colonel Roosevelt, who underwent two operations in Roosevelt Hospital last week, is steadily improving, according to his physicians, and they believe tonight that his recovery is only a matter of time. He will in all probability suffer acutely for several days, but unless complications set in they regard his recovery as certain. All that he needs now is rest and quiet.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 10.—Former President William H. Taft, who is lecturing at Camp Pike today, sent to Colonel Roosevelt a telegram expressing regret at the colonel's illness and hope his recovery would be speedy.

BELGIAN GRAIN SHIP IS SUNK BY SUBMARINE

LONDON, Feb. 9.—The Belgian relief committee has received a telegram which reports steamship Friesland, torpedoed Thursday, carried a cargo of grain for the commission's work in Belgium.

ELGIN AND WALLOWA BOYS ARE STILL ON THE MISSING LIST OF THE TUSCANIA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—1832 names of American soldiers rescued on the Tuscania were reported tonight to the War Department. 345 soldiers are still unaccounted for. No official statement has been made, changing the report that all of the American soldiers had been accounted for except 113 men, but the names of those saved are coming very slowly by cable and there is no assurance when it will be complete.

From the names so far received and the passenger list of those on the lost steamer, the Associated Press has compiled a list of those still not reported among the survivors (232 of them are survivors and will be reported safe in Ireland soon).

GERMAN NEWSPAPERS GLOAT

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 9.—German newspapers are gloating over the "psychological effect" which they think the sinking of the Tuscania must produce in America. Koelnische Volkszeitung says the event must unflinchingly dampen the spirit of America to say the least. "Sundry American vessels, some with munitions and perhaps a small number of soldiers, have been sunk before, but as far as we know, this is the first case of a big transport falling victim to our U-boats. Maybe large-sized transports have never or rarely so far crossed, for the American forces in France are not yet very large. As such vessels must be conveyed with great care, our U-boat achievement is all the more remarkable and gratifying."

Germany Sends Ultimatum to Rumania

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The Associated Press learns that confirmation has been received in Russian quarters in London of Germany sending an ultimatum to Roumania. It was presented Tuesday and expired yesterday. The Roumanian cabinet resigned Friday.

BASEL, Switzerland, Feb. 10.—German newspapers state that Field Marshal von Mackensen sent an ultimatum to Roumania on February 6, demanding that peace negotiations be begun within four days. The Roumanian cabinet resigned.

SHIPBUILDING ZONES ESTABLISHED

(Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Division of the country into six shipbuilding zones with a competent ship builder in charge of each as zone director, is planned by the Emergency Fleet Corporation as a means of speeding up shipbuilding operations. There will be two zones each on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, and one each on the Gulf and the Great Lakes.

The plan calls for almost complete decentralization of shipbuilding work. Construction in each zone will be put in the hands of the zone director, who will be given full authority to act for the fleet corporation.

BELIEVES WAR WILL END SOON

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. (Special).—Henry Claws, a well known financier, in a public statement expressed the belief that the war will end soon. He says this belief is growing stronger every day in financial circles.
