PORTLAND MARKET LETTER February 13, 1918 The market has continued firm throughout the day in all departments. The feature of the day was a heavy shipment of feeder and stock cattle passing the yards on contract. The general beef market

showed no variations from previous quotations, but ready sales were found for all material entering the yards. The hog market continues active, steady prices prevailing, with a light shipment of medium quality. No changes were shown in conditions in the sheep houses and practically no receipts arrived to affect the market conditions. The following quotations prevail in the various departments: CATTLE—Medium to choice steers, \$19.35@11; good to medium steers, \$9.35@10.35; common to good steers, \$8@10; choice cows and heifers, \$8@10; common to good cows and heifers, \$6.75@8.15;
