FARMERS, HAVE YOU FILLED IN YOUR QUESTIONNAIRES?

There has been sent out over the entire county to the farmers of practically every community a questionnaire asking them for information as to the probable acreage for 1918 as against 1917, the livestock on hand now as against a year ago, the probable labor demands for the season of 1918, and a few questions as to the need situation. We are already beginning to wonder as to the labor situation this summer; whether the Federal Government is going to be able to assist us. At the present time they are asking you, as individual farmers, what your labor problem is, and if you do not furnish them with the information they are asking for we can hardly expect them to know what our condition is.

You may have filled in a list of questions of a somewhat similar nature a time or two during the previous year, and it probably has taken a little of your time. However it is up to us to furnish the information, and though it may occasionally require that we answer the same question more than once, still we should be willing to furnish it whenever required. These are unusual times, and it is up to each and every one of us to do whatever we can to assist the Government in handling the enormous task which they are facing.

Have you already filled in the questionnaire which has been handed you? If not kindly do so immediately and return to the party who gave it to you, or mail to the County Agricultural Agent.

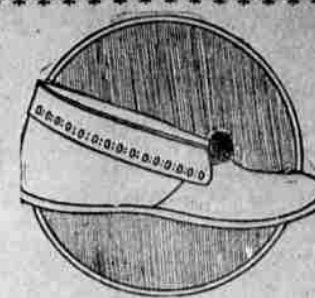
