LIBERTY THEATERS OPEN TO SOLDIERS



The new Liberty Theaters, where Uncle Sam's soldiers will be entertained while they are in camp training for the trenches in France are opening in the cantonments and national guard camps. The soldiers are seeing real shows, same as if they were on Broadway.

At Camp Custer, Michigan, the Liberty Theater opened with a concert given by the combined bands of the entire division, under the direction of Bohumir Kryl.

Each National Army Cantonment now has a theater building, 120 by 270 feet, seating 3,000 men. As yet, most of the national guard camps

are using the large Chautauqua tents, seating 2,000. Theaters will be built in these camps in the spring. Camp commanders say the Liberty Theaters and Tents are doing more than anything else to keep the soldiers in camp and in good spirits. The advantages pointed out are that through these entertainments, soldiers remain in camp and save their money, instead of spending it in the adjacent cities and towns and that they save in railroad transportation and in hours of sleep.

At the Military Entertainment Council, in Washington, it is reported that the recent order of the Fuel Administration, closing the printing shops, has caused a temporary shortage in Smileage books. More books are being rushed out, and it is announced that any one desiring their soldier friends to have Smileage early, should hunt up the local committee and leave an order.

Miss Cecile Hindman played her first piano recital in La Grande to a very appreciative audience at the High School auditorium Monday night.

The program was well arranged and well balanced and consisted mostly of compositions from the romantic school of music. In her playing, Miss Hindman distinguished herself by a remarkable singing tone quality, by her delicate playing of the many difficult runs and passages for finger work, and by her fine interpretation of the different pieces on the program.

Her playing was characterized throughout by an innate musical feeling and by a fine abandon of the varying moods of the compositions.

The "March" by MacDowell called for considerable strength, but found the pianist equal to its demands. The closing number, the Beethoven "Concerto," displayed a fine finger technique and a splendid ensemble.

Miss Hindman was most ably supported in the "Concerto" by Mrs. Wood Berry, who played the difficult arrangements from the orchestral score on a second piano with ease

and fluency. Mrs. J. J. Carr sang two charming songs, "May Morning" by Denon, and "The Slumber Boat" by Gaynor. Both songs were most artistically sung and showed Mrs. Carr's lyric soprano to great advantage.

Mrs. A. L. Richardson sang "A Spirit Flower" by Campbell-Tipton, and the Jewel Song from Gounod's "Faust." The Jewel Song calls for much vocal technique as well as much dramatic ability. Mrs. Richardson sang at her best in this number and sang it so splendidly that the scene of the dancing jewels seemed very real. Both singers were enthusiastically endorsed.

Mrs. Berry was the accompanist for both soloists and proved herself an able mistress of the difficult art of accompanying.
