REAL BACKGROUND IN METRO FEATURE

Real settings and background are provided for Harold Lockwood in his newest starring vehicle, "The Avenging Trail," a five-act photoplay version of Henry Owen's novel of the lumber colony in the North, "Gaston Olaf," which is being shown for the last time at Sherry's theatre today. In order to get the real atmosphere, Director Francis Ford and a company of over twenty members journeyed to one of the largest lumber camps in the White Mountains of New Hampshire and spent three weeks' time filming the exterior scenes.

The process of lumbering from the cutting of the timber until the time it is loaded on flat cars and transported to the market is shown in the picture and provides an interesting insight into the dramatic action of the story, which, in itself, is considered one of the most powerful ever afforded Mr. Lockwood during his starring career.

For the mob scenes the entire crew of lumberjacks from the camp, in which Mr. Lockwood was working, was requisitioned and their number was supplemented by scores of other lumberjacks working in near-by camps.
