## EVERY CITIZEN CAN HELP WIN THE WAR

R. N. Stanfield Says Prosecution of the War Means We Must Give Every Aid and Assistance to the Allies.

STANFIELD, Or., Feb. 16.—(Special.)—The important part every citizen must take in winning the war was emphasized in a statement issued today by R. N. Stanfield, who has just returned from a two weeks' trip through the Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon in the interest of his candidacy for the United States Senate. Mr. Stanfield said he was pleased with the results of the trip which afforded him an opportunity to meet a great many voters and to present to them personally his candidacy. He expects to make Portland his headquarters until the date of the primary election and will direct his campaign in person from that city. "Prosecution of the war means that we must give every aid and assistance to our allies who are maintaining the real front line of our defense and through the maintenance of this front and front line stop the enemy from reaching our own shores and our own land," said Mr. Stanfield.

"Until we can put our own men in the trenches in large numbers we must depend upon the Allies to hold it. This service they have rendered and are still rendering with a heroic spirit of devotion and sacrifice. To attain these ends, we must necessarily do our work at home, in raising money, supplies and armies to be trained. Back of this every loyal American citizen must stand firmly, regardless of whether or not the methods used or the means employed meet with his personal approval. It is the method which our government has adopted and until it breaks down completely or shows unmistakable signs of collapse we, each and every one of us, must stand back of it, work for it and with the men at the head who are the directing energy.

"The peace which will follow the successful prosecution of the war must be acceptable to the Democracy of the world, and by that is meant as President Wilson has said,

a lasting peace in which the people themselves are directly interested; one which the people themselves will make and bound by treaties which the peoples, who are to abide by them, make. That is a peace which would endure and which could not be rudely broken or shattered by the will or whim or lust for power of some bureaucratic imperialist. "The army of fighting men is not the sole means by which this war will be won. The men who remain behind are just as important a part of the fighting integral as the soldier in khaki, the chief distinction between them being that the soldier is the man who is making the supreme sacrifice, and, while he is willing to give his life, if need be, the man who remains behind must be willing to make sacrifices. "In the application of the selective draft, the framers of the bill intended that it should operate so as to provide both the fighting army and the industrial army, the army which remains at home and provides the sinews wherewith the war is prosecuted. In the application of the draft it is not necessary to take all the men who are of military age. It is just as important that the workers be provided for harvesting our crops and maintaining our factories and when the opportunity is offered to exercise a choice or selection in conscripting the army the authorities should take into consideration the value which the man has to the whole scheme of things. "Neither is it necessary to increase the grief and woe of our peoples. While it might look like discrimination on the face of it, yet the young man without wife or child should be first selected for the fighting line, leaving the family, which is the unit of all democratic governments, intact so far as possible. "That is what I believe the mean-

ing of the selective draft to be—the selection of men for the fighting line, for the industrial army, for the family unit and for the operation of all our governmental machinery which, in its coordination, must be

the fighting machine of America." Mr. Stanfield also has positive views on the subject of food regulation and control. He firmly believes that the price of all commodities should be regulated, but at all

times only with full consideration of the cost of labor and production. Discussing this subject, Mr. Stanfield said: (Continued on Page 4.)
