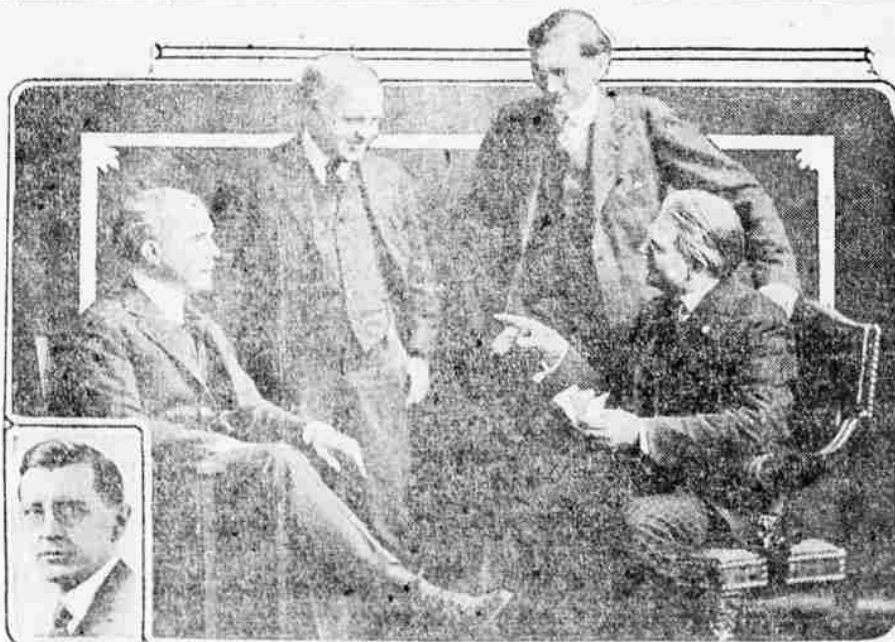

CHAUTAUQUA MANAGERS IN WAR WORK

The biggest Chautauqua managers in the United States have pooled their interests, temporarily, in the patriotic campaign to provide entertainment for soldiers in the cantonments and national guard camps. Not only are they furnishing the best talent the Chautauqua field affords, but they have, for the time, merged their big competing circuit organizations, which reach 15,000 communities from coast to coast and from the Great Lakes to the Gulf, to make the Smilge book campaign a success.

The campaign is supplying the one-dollar and five-dollar Smilge books, filled with coupons signed by the Secretary of War, which pass soldiers to all shows in the cantonments and national guard camps. The little books are said to be going like hot cakes and reports from the

camp say the soldier boys are already smiling.
The spectacle of the chiefs of a half dozen big rival organizations, which, ordinarily, fight for talent and towns in which to put on the high-class entertainment and lecture attractions which millions of Americans see every season, working side by side in the Military Entertainment Council, is said to be regarded in Washington as one of the most notable examples of patriotic co-operation of the war. These men hire and manage each Chautauqua star as William Jennings Bryan, Dr. Gustavus, the well known Chicago preacher; Bohemian Kryn, the big band leader, and a hundred or more other men and women whom most of us have heard and seen under the Chautauqua tents.
In Washington these managers work together, eat together and plan

together, and each has decided, they admit, that the other fellows are not such bad fellows after all. When they get through the Smilge campaign, they will go back home and each will probably begin to try to put it over good naturedly on his rivals, who will probably be having the same desire on him.

Pearson, Chautauqua Association of Pennsylvania, Swarthmore, Pa.; Frank M. Chaffee, Century Lyceum Bureau, Evanston, Ill.; Charles F. Horner, Redpath-Horner Chautauqua, Kansas City; Keith Vawter, Redpath-Vawter Chautauqua, Cedar Rapids, Ia., and Harry P. Harrison, of Chicago, head of the Redpath Chautauqua, and executive chairman of the Smilge campaign.
