BARLEY BREAD

One quart potato water, one-third cup mashed potato, two tablespoons sugar, one tablespoon melted fat, one teaspoon salt, one-half cake of compressed yeast, two cups wheat flour, barley flour to make a soft dough.

Make a sponge of the potato water, mashed potato, sugar, salt, fat, yeast, wheat flour and about one cup of barley flour. Allow to stand over night. Add the remainder of the barley flour to form a soft dough. When this has doubled in bulk, cut down and allow to rise a second time. Form into loaves. When the dough has doubled its bulk bake in moderately hot oven. This bread contains the largest proportion of barley flour and the smallest proportion of wheat flour, which can be used to produce good results. More wheat flour may be used if desired.
