"CONSISTENCY" THAT'S JOE RAY, WHO HAS MOST CONSISTENT ATHLETIC RECORD



It is quite likely that Joe Ray will never break the world record for the mile, set a couple of years ago at 4:12 3-5 by Norman Tabor. It is fair to assume that he will never be able to equal his own records at the mile and a half or two miles. Ray possibly has trotted over the distances as fast as he ever will trot.

But in his few years on American tracks Ray probably has run the mile oftener under 4.20 indoor and outdoor than any other miler. He is perhaps the most consistent distance runner the world has ever

seen.

Not long ago, at Boston, Ray won the two-mile in comparatively slow time. Probably he could have run faster, but he was not pressed. But during his career he has negotiated the mile and two miles in faster time oftener than any other athlete. Ray, himself, hasn't the records to show how often he has beat 4.20 in the mile.

Ray's record is just another link in the chain that proves that modern athletes are greater than those of earlier days.

WAR SERVICE AIMS RECITED

As was stated yesterday in The Observer the dominant aim of this week's nation-wide campaign of the Lutheran church among its adherents for a minimum fund of \$750,000 for Soldiers' and Sailors' Welfare, is personal service to the men under arms.

It is a work that has received the specific endorsement of President Wilson, of Secretaries Baker and Daniels, and of many Governors and Congressmen. Chairman Fosdick, of the "Fosdick Commission," says of it: "Work of this kind is most serviceable and I can assure you of the hearty cooperation of the

Commission on Training Camp Activities."

John R. Mott, General Secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and one of the great Christian world statesmen of this generation, has lately most forcibly and most truly declared, with reference to this work: "Our camps need laymen and pastors just as much as our towns do. The Y. M. C. A. is a body of laymen; Commissioned and volunteer chaplains are pastors. Together they represent the church. Both are indispensable to our Army and Navy. They should seek in every way in their power to support each other. The Association cannot perform the functions of the pastor. Its desire and purpose is to strengthen the hands of the pastors in every way in its power."

In harmony with this view, it is the desire of the Lutheran War Commission, as of the other denominations engaged in similar activities, to put to the fullest and most efficient use for the personal spiritual

welfare of its young men with the colors, the instrumentalities provided by the generosity of the American people.

Millions have been spent to provide buildings and equipment for social, recreational and religious activities in the camps. Every camp has its Y. M. C. A. huts, "the touch of home that goes with the men." In nearly 70 camps there are the halls of the Knights of Columbus. The Fosdick Commission is vigorously pushing the erection of soldiers' clubs, camp theatres, and community halls.

The conviction is rising to the forefront among well informed men that building and equipment facilities are ample, that the great need at present is consecrated man-power of the highest type to inspire the men with the colors by their presence and by their service. At a conference in New York City recently, Mr. Ward, the Y. M. C. A. man, made the statement:

"We have enough buildings to take care of any emergency. We need men. And if we don't get them, or don't get the biggest type, our buildings will be of little use."

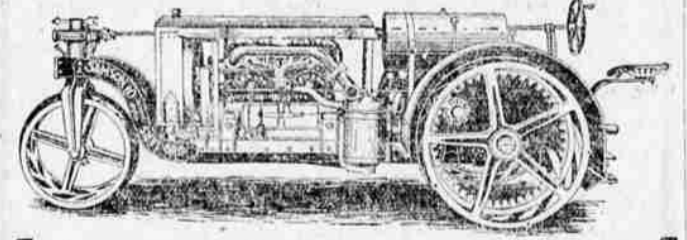
The National Lutheran Commission has aimed to add to the man-power in the camps that is working to maintain the spiritual values. It has canvassed the church to get the men best fitted for the work. In many cases they were serving large congregations. Their congregations were persuaded to release them or give them a furlough because the work with the Army was considered more important than any work of the church at present. Prof. Charles M. Jacobs, D. D., of Mt. Airy Seminary, Philadelphia, Pa., stated the sentiment of the Church recently. He said:

"Any one who is not willing to make any, even the greatest sacrifice, personal or material, in this emergency is committing the sin of the centuries."

The personal service in the camps has meant much to the men in camp, to the mothers and fathers at home. One camp pastor writes:

"The work here is moving along most satisfactorily. The two local churches have appointed a joint committee of men who are backing me to a man. We have opened our recreation rooms and have them equipped with furniture, stationary, reading matter and games, with smoking material in addition. The newspapers give us a fine boost on this venture. I have had cards printed announcing the opening of the rooms, and also postals giving notice of special communion service next Sunday night for soldiers. So far I have spoken to four Lutheran soldier congregations."

"The correspondence feature of this field is becoming larger. I receive letters from all over Pennsylvania inquiring about some brothers in camp. This requires time and considerable expense. I received

must fill up the gaps left by the withdrawal of men and horses from the ranks of the agricultural army.

The United States Department of Agriculture estimates, as a result of a thorough canvass, that 34,371 farm tractors were working on American farms during the year 1917.

Let us remember there are battles on the farm lands as important as those at the front. Let us remember the silent heroes fighting the battle of food production on many a farm the young men have left to serve the flag. Yet the older men and the women are meeting the crisis with the aid of the farm tractor.
