BRITISH TOMMIES IN FRANCE ASK THEIR KINSMEN HERE IN AMERICA TO "COME IN OUT OF THE DRAFT"



When the British Tommies and the Canadians in France and elsewhere heard that the Alien Draft Convention between Great Britain and the United States had been approved by the United States they sent this message back to all British and Canadians of military age in the United States: "Come on in out of the draft!" There are at least two hundred thousand British and Canadians of military age, 20 to 40 years, in the United States who are subject to the draft, and as Brigadier-General W. A. White of the British-Canadian Recruiting Mission said today, "None of these can escape liability to serve in war. The arrangement is a perfectly fair one, for it compels every man who claims

British citizenship to place himself upon practically the same footing as his fellow countrymen at home; and surely citizenship should carry with it obligations as well as advantages. After congress passes the necessary legislation, they will have sixty days in which to enlist in the British or Canadian armies. However, they will be doing far better work if they enlist at once and do not wait a few weeks longer for the draft. What we want at present is man power. If the Britisher and Canadian enlist with us, they can get to Europe quickly and be made effective much sooner than if they wait to be drafted. There is a branch of the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission in every big centre in the United States, consequently it is an easy

matter for every Britisher and Canadian to do his plain duty for liberty and humanity."

Some eighteen thousand men have already volunteered for the British and Canadian armies since the Mission began its work in the last week of June, 1917. The Tommies are a cheerful lot, even when conditions are unpleasant. A close-range snapshot of a group of them even when they are ready to go to the front line trenches shows any number of smiling faces. They say that the Germans do not stick out to the bitter end nowadays as they did earlier in the war, and many of them seem not at all averse to yelling "Kamerad!" upon slight provocation and holding up their hands in sur-

renderance.

BITTEN BY MAD DOG

Ed. Wolf, the Victim, Goes to Portland for Treatment

Ed. Wolf of Pyle Canyon was bitten last Saturday by a dog that belonged to him, and supposing that the dog showed symptoms of rabies, Mr. Wolf left Sunday for Portland for treatment.

The dog had bitten a number of cattle and was finally killed by the owner of another dog with which the Wolf dog was fighting. Mr. Wolf took the head of his dog to Portland

British Reports From the Front.

Other dogs along Pyle Canyon and Tolocast sections have been ordered killed or penned up and muzzled and the strictest watch will be kept for any further outbreak among dogs and other animals of that district. Later, Dr. Lamb received a letter from the secretary of the State Board of Health, Dr. R. E. L. Holt, stating that an examination of the head of the Wolf dog showed negro bodies in the brain, which indicate rabies, and that Mr. Wolf will have to remain in Portland about three weeks.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Minor raids are reported from the British front. On the French front artillery firing is active around Talour, where American gunners are aiding the French; also in the Champagne region in Upper Alsace. French raids are reported successful north of Allette. The British in Mesopotamia have occupied Khana-Burayat and are now within ten miles of Hit on the Euphrates west of Bagdad.
