IS HALLOWED SPOT

Valley Forge Will For All Time Be Held in Glorious Memory by Americans.

VALLEY FORGE is a name which inspires unspeakable emotions in every reader of the Revolutionary story, appealing to the depth of the pathetic in us to their sufferings and to our sublimest sense by their fortitude. That winter at Valley Forge surpasses the retreat from Moscow, for the American heroes and their great commander endured through the long winter instead of fleeing.

"How comes it, sir," said Washington to the officer as they marched into the valley, "that I have tracked the march of your troops by the blood-stains on the frozen ground? Were there no shoes in the commissary's stores, that this sad spectacle is to be seen along the public highway?"

The officer replied: "When shoes were issued the regiments were served in turn; it was our misfortune to be among the last and the stores became exhausted."

Washington's emotions were of the strongest kind and he said, "Poor fellows!"

"At no period of the war," writes Chief Justice Marshall, "had the American army been reduced to a situation of greater peril than during the winter at Valley Forge. More than once they were absolutely without food. There was seldom at any time a quantity of provisions sufficient for a week. The returns of the first of February exhibited the astonishing number of

3,000 men in camp unfit for duty for want of clothes. Of this number scarcely a man had a pair of shoes. Although the total of the army exceeded 17,000 men, the effective rank and file amounted to 5,012. Their clothes were in tatters. The Quaker Isaac Potts tells us of Washington's prayer at Valley Forge, how, as he traversed the forest, he heard a fervent voice. Approaching nearer, whom should he behold, in a kind of bower, but the commander in chief on his knees praying to the Ruler of the Universe. At the moment when Friend Potts, concealed by the trees, came up, Washington was interceding for his beloved country. When he reached home his wife asked the reason for his agitation.

"I have this day seen," replied he, "what I shall never forget. If George Washington be not a man of God, I am mistaken, and still more shall I be disappointed if God, through him, does not perform some great thing for the country."

"GERMANY LOOKS LIKE THE DEVIL"

American Dentist, Back From Berlin, Says Only Soldier Presents Good Appearance.

"The German soldier looks fine, but everything else in Germany looks like the devil."

This is the summary of Teutonic conditions by Dr. William Law, a native of Flint, Mich., who is back visiting his parents after practicing dentistry for 13 years in Berlin, where he served the Kaiser's family professionally.

Doctor Law's family was able to leave with Ambassador Gerard's party, but the doctor himself was too ill to travel and remained in Berlin until October 23, 1917. Doctor Law, after many delays in Europe, arrived here recently.

"There are today 100,000 to 125,000 empty stores and residences in Berlin, where normally in peace times the number would not exceed 35,000 to 40,000," said Doctor Law. "The big change has been wrought because many businesses have gone bankrupt, as people are moving in together to conserve necessities of life. Stores that are open have little or nothing left in them."

"The people cry for peace, and the leaders of the military party say: 'We've offered peace to the entente and they refuse it.' So the people go on. They are the most patient lot I ever saw."

"The soldier gets plenty of food taken from that on route from some empty house, perhaps to a hospital. The man at the hospital, who checks on the food, gets part of the graft."

"I think the people of Germany can exist for another year. However, there is no tea or no coffee and the beer is about like water and tastes like varnish. When a person hasn't shoes now he goes barefoot, or else gets wooden soles put on the old ones."

"Every bit of oil is gone, even to

castor oil, which has been used for lubricating purposes. Every sort of factory is engaged in making things for war, therefore there is a shortage in everyday necessities."

"The military party of Germany will die fighting, whether they are killed by the allies or by their own people in an uprising after Germany has been crushed. The winning of the war for the allies now depends on how big a fleet of airplanes America can send to France."

He was simple in manner, dress and bearing, but was big of heart and brain.

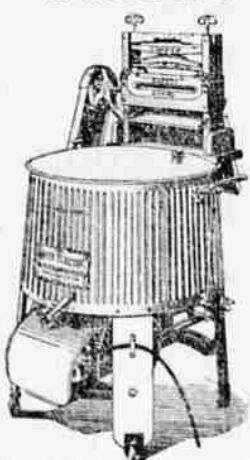
He was too great a nature to care one way or another about his ancestry. The living generation was of vital importance to him.
