IMBLER IS READY FOR LOAN DRIVE

IMBLER, Feb. 26.—(Special).—The Union County organization committee which has in charge the financing of the forces preparatory to successfully conducting the next Liberty Loan drive, met at Imbler on the 21st inst., and, together with some of the citizens of the Imbler-Summersville district discussed the war situation. The manner of handling the next loan drive was explained by Walter L. Pierce, with minor details being further made clear by Messrs. Larrierson, Seroggin, Hill and Bodmer of the La Grande visitors. The gathering was fairly well attended and a committee was appointed for both Imbler and Summersville, with the understanding that the committees combine their reports when dealing with the headquarters at La Grande. From the interest evidenced by those in attendance there is no doubt but that the North end of the Grande Ronde valley will do its share in the common cause.

WINTER STILL LINGERS

Heavy Storm and Four Feet of Snow at Beaver Intake. Those who sprung the theory that winter would end automatically along about now have a guess or two left. Butternuts still have about three inches of snow to dig through since yesterday evening. City Manager Currey was advised this morning that a heavy storm prevails at the Beaver creek intake and the snow-in that locality is four feet deep.

DEMAND FOR CATTLE IS ON THE UPGRADE

PORTLAND, Feb. 25.—The opening hours in the morning's bart at the North Portland Yards showed strong signs of a decline in the cattle market. When trading was well under way, however, it developed that the demand was good for steers and top classes, which sold readily on a steady market. The sale of "she" stuff, however, was somewhat slow and in some instances, especially in the medium and poorer classes there was a sacrifice of price which developed mostly in the after part of the day. Some very fair specimens of baby beef were offered on the market and sold on a par with top cows and steers. The calf market continued strong and there were no changes in the activity of the bull market.

The hog market opened very slowly with low bids and high holdings. Generally speaking, however, the holders won, which served as a strong bull in the hog alleys, lifting the tops to 17c and developing a considerable strength in the entire hog market.

The sheep market continued steady for the day, with light offerings and fair demand, without any changes in prices.

HOGS—Prime light, 16.85-17.00; prime heavy, 16.60-16.85; pigs, 14.00-15.25; bulk, 16.85. SHEEP—Western lambs, 15.00-15.50; Valley lambs, 14.50-15.00; yearlings, 13.00-13.50; wethers, 12.50-13.00; ewes, 9.00-12.00.

TED THYE WILL MEET GEO. LAMBERT

Geo. Lambert, of San Francisco, recently issued a challenge to wrestle Jack O'Neill or Ted Thye, separately or otherwise, at any time or any place and Thye has taken exceptions to his def, accepted his challenge and the men have agreed to settle their differences next Friday night, March 1, at the Arcade. A purse of \$200 has been posted and the winner of the contest, which is to be a finish event, will take all the money.

Lambert and Thye met last month at Wallowa in a handicap match in which Lambert agreed to throw Thye twice in an hour, or forfeit all rights to the purse. Lambert failed to throw Thye and since that time Mr. Lambert has been on Thye's trail continually, believing he can beat him in a finish match. Thye is well known to the local wrestling fans, having wrestled O'Neill here last July. He is a clean cut, gentlemanly athlete who makes friends wherever he appears. When not wrestling he is working as a boiler maker at the shops. Thye has the distinction of wrestling more matches in 1917 than any other wrestler on the Pacific Coast, having participated in about 75 contests during the year.

Lambert is a former Olympic Club man and has wrestled professionally for years. He is recognized as a clever wrestler with unusual strength and keeps himself in condition at all times.
