### NAVY RECRUITS ARE NEEDED

Training Camp at Seattle Will Again Receive Enlistments.

Enlistment in the naval service has been reopened at the U. S. Naval Training Camp, Seattle. Any citizen between 18 and 35 is eligible.

Recruits will receive a thorough course in naval instruction, said course averaging about four months. This camp is regarded by naval officers as having the best all-round combination of advantages of any naval training camp in the country. It is located on the grounds of the University of Washington and fronting on Lakes Washington and Union. All the facilities of the University are available for instruction.

In connection with the station is the U. S. S. Princeton used for ship training. It is found that men who are trained at this camp have a decided advantage when going to sea by reason of special knowledge gained while under instruction here, and many of them are rapidly promoted.

This camp is now being considerably enlarged. Additional recruits will be taken until the camp is filled up.

## "YOU'VE GOT TO FIGHT FOR SOMEONE!" THE MANDATE OF THE NEW DRAFT AGREEMENT WITH BRITAIN AND CANADA



"You've got to fight for someone!" That's practically what the new international draft arrangement between the United States and Great Britain says to every one of the 200,000 Britishers and Canadians residing in the United States.

The idea that only British subjects of the American draft age—21 to 31—will be liable to conscription, is entirely erroneous, because the new agreement with Great Britain and Canada provides that the subjects of the two countries between the ages of twenty and forty years inclusive shall be liable for military service, a prominent officer of the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission declared today.

Every day the familiar British phrase "Carry on!" gains newer and deeper meaning. So far as Great Britain and Canada are concerned, they are determined to fight on until the Germans are thoroughly beaten.

Major Donald Guthrie of the Canadian Army, who spent two and one-half years at the front in France, told his young son that if wounded, he must get back to the casualty clearing station at the earliest possible moment to avoid the consequences of gas gangrene. The boy was wounded, but continued to fight for five hours. When reproved later by the major, he said, "Why, father, what could I do? Our major and I were the only officers left, and as he lay on the ground before me, he called out, 'Carry on!' and died and I stayed until the attack was repelled."

That is the spirit behind the words "Carry on!" Major Guthrie's son enlisted as a private and is now a captain in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces.

Just before dawn is a favorite time for troops in France to move up to the front line trenches and pre-

pare for the day's work. Silhouetted against the sky, they are not only determined but picturesque as well as they "Carry on."

Moving up the guns in France is an interesting but difficult maneuver owing to the soft character of the ground and the great weight of the guns. Despite the labor involved the men are always cheerful because the guns are moving toward the enemy. When the big British guns are shelling the German trenches, the noise of the cannonading is often heard on the south coast of Kent, England, and even as far as the outskirts of London.

"Can the Germans break through on the Western front?" Major Guthrie was asked.

"Two and a half years ago they could not do it, and they might as well try to pull the sun from the heavens as to break through now," was the spirited reply.

## RED CROSS News and Notes

### EXPLAINS DELAY IN MAILING RED CROSS MAGAZINES

The following letter dated February 15th from the Red Cross magazine will serve to answer the many questions as to why copies for new subscribing members have been delayed:

"Red Cross magazines have invariably been mailed from here to Christmas drive subscribers within ten days after receipt of their names at this office.

"And this has been done in spite of the fact that nearly 450,000 names have been received since January 1st. Every list has had to be counted and acknowledged to Chapter and to Division headquarters. Every name has had to be stenciled, proof-read and filed. The files have had to be arranged alphabetically by postoffice. Wrappers have been addressed, filled with magazines and packed into mail bags and delivered to the postoffice. Four of the largest printing establishments in America have been manufacturing the magazines day and night. Probably no other magazine has ever had such a task or such a rapid growth in circulation—from 240 last July to 1,300,000 now.

"If, therefore, you have from us the form acknowledgment of receipt of your lists, please do not write complaints concerning non-receipt of magazines, but bear in mind that the magazine class of mail is terribly congested all over the country, that transportation facilities are poor and in many cases it is taking weeks for the postoffice and railroads to deliver mail that is usually delivered in a few days. "Your patience in this will be very much appreciated."

Missouri Man Makes Accusation Against Rural Districts.

C. F. Shope, a Carroll County Missouri, farmer, successfully operating the farm on which he was born and life long friend of many of the farmers he addressed, threw a bomb into the conference last week by saying that the farmers are slackers, so reports a Carroll County local paper.
