WANT CANADIAN RAILROADERS

Volunteers for This Branch of the Service Are in Demand. Upon the efficiency of the railroads behind the lines of the Allied Armies in France, depends not only the lives of the men going "over the top" but the final outcome of the great conflict which is about to be staged on the Western front. To play her full part Canada has lately increased her army, on the firing line, and this has necessitated increased railroad operations. Information has been received at the British and Canadian recruiting office, Third and Oak streets,

Portland, that an additional Canadian Railroad Construction Corps is to be raised and sent to France immediately, and an appeal is made to all British and Canadian subjects with railroad experience to offer themselves for this branch of the service immediately. Special rates of pay are offered to men with experience as blockmen, shunters, drivers, firemen, tubers and blacksmiths, but men with practically any kind of railroad experience will be accepted for this branch of the service. The Canadian rate of pay is \$1.19 per day, and dependents of married men receive a separation allowance of \$25.00 per month besides an allowance, where needed, from the British Oregon Patriotic Fund. Do not be drafted but enlist immediately in the branch of service you prefer to serve in. Free transportation will be provided on application. Entertainment at Summerville. MARKET NEWS

DEMAND FOR FEEDERS

Choice Steers Continue on Same Basis in Portland.

PORTLAND, Feb. 28.—Wednesday's market opened with a string of about 400 cattle, practically all of which were feeders which found a steady and strong market. The demand for feeders is exceptionally keen with dealers looking out for every possible animal to fill their orders. Choice steers continue on the same basis as Monday and Tuesday. Cows and heifers are steady at \$8.50 to \$9.50 for top quality. Common cows and heifers are steady. Bulls are showing a little weakness and calves are strong for all classes. In the hog section the receipts were nominal, but 500 head being received. Prices are steady, top hogs bringing \$16.85 to \$17.00. The bulk of them going over the scales at \$16.85. Sheep receipts fairly good, with 625 in the sheep house. Market is steady at previous quotations.

RACES BETTER THAN EVER

State Fair Continues Harness Races With Increased Purse. Through a misunderstanding, the report has become current that the State Fair at Salem this year would have no races except those held in the new stadium. PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Feb. 28.—The singing of popular songs by American soldiers on active duty "over there" is advocated by their superior officers, according to a U. S. Marine just returned from France. He declares that most of the popular song hits of the day are familiar to the troops in the trenches and that they sing them at every opportunity. "Singing is a soldier's second nature," said the Marine. "It drives away loneliness and helps to lighten the spirits of the boys. The soldier who can pick a banjo or guitar is a welcome comrade in any camp, not only to the enlisted men but to the officers as well."
