## NO DANGER OF HOME PRODUCT

A few publications have recently given circulation to a statement that there is danger of botulism poisoning from eating foods canned in the homes by the Cold Pack method. This statement is absolutely false, as is proven by five well-known facts:

1. Botulism is found only in spoiled foods, and housewives do not can spoiled goods.
2. If food is not properly canned and spoils after canning, it is not likely to contain botulism bacilli.
3. Even though it did contain these bacilli, no housewife is apt to serve spoiled canned goods on the table; certainly few, if any, would eat it.

4. If there were danger in eating food canned in the home by the Cold Pack method, there would be an equal danger in eating commercially canned goods, which are packed by the same method.
5. If there were any truth in the statement people would be dying by the hundreds of thousands—would have died by the millions—because all of us are and for years have been, eating cold packed canned goods.

It would seem there is no need to say more regarding this absurd statement. It is evident the article was prepared for the purpose of discouraging cold pack canning in the homes next season, when, more than at any time in our history, home gardens, home canning and drying should be encouraged.

No matter where this statement originated or who is responsible for its circulation, it is a vicious and unpatriotic bit of misinformation and deceit.

The Cold Pack method has been in use many years and, except for home drying, is the only way to save for winter use the surplus products of the home gardens of the country.

Housewives have too much common sense, too much patriotism, to be influenced or misled by such foolish statements.

### Boy Scouts Active.

Every Boy Scout in the country has enlisted for service for the duration of the Thrift Stamp and War Savings Stamp campaign. Five million red postcards are being distributed to assist the boys in the sale of Stamps. They will make personal solicitation to have the cards signed by their friends. They will not be called upon to collect money. The postcards, after they have been signed, will be mailed, no stamps being required, and the Thrift Stamps or War Savings Stamps called for in the order will be delivered by the mail carrier.

Every Boy Scout selling \$250 worth of cards will be made an "Ace," and will be awarded a suit-

able medal. For every \$100 worth of Stamps sold in addition to the first \$250 worth a "palm" decoration will be added to the "Ace" medal, and at the end of the year's campaign, the Boy Scout in each State with the largest total of sales to his credit will receive a letter of thanks from the President of the United States.

### Wheat May Go Still Higher.

Prediction is made by A. A. Elmore, state president of the Farmers Union for Washington, who has just returned from Washington, D. C., that if the wheat crop this year is light a price fixing committee will be named by the President to raise the price of wheat in excess of the price now fixed, says the East Oregonian.

"I am sure the administration is going to deal fairly with the farmers and I hope the Northwestern states will prove to the administration their appreciation by reaping every bushel of food products that this country is capable of producing during the season of 1918," says the letter from Mr. Elmore to W. W. Harrah.

### Ship Apples East.

J. B. Stoddard of Fruitdale, finished loading a car of apples yesterday evening for shipment to the Eastern markets. Several carload shipments from Fruitdale have been made, the principal ones being from the Deacons and Thompson orchards. In most cases the growers report fair returns.

### Make Starch From Potatoes.

Small or rough potatoes should not be thrown away or wasted, for they can easily be converted into potato starch. A complete and easy recipe for making potato starch is given in a bulletin entitled, "Potato Starch and Its Use in the Home," a copy of which can be obtained by addressing O. H. Benson, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Potatoes also may be used in making yeast bread, the following recipe being sufficient for three loaves:

One-half cup milk and water; 4 tablespoons sugar; 1½ teaspoons cups boiled potatoes; 8 cups flour; ½ cake compressed yeast; ½ cup warm water. All the flour may be added in the first mixture, or a part may be reserved and added at the second kneading. The dough is soft after the second handling, but after baking produces a satisfactory loaf.
