LIFE IN SCREEN PLAY

One of the most impressive scenes ever produced on the screen is the visualization of Hoffman's wonderful painting, "Mary Magdalene Brought Before Christ," which will be shown in the Metro wonderplay starring Ethel Barrymore, "The Lifted Veil," which will be seen at the Sherry theatre today only.
