STILL THE CALL IS FOR MORE NURSES

Surgeon General Gorgas Urges Young Women to Take Up Training Courses.

Nurses, more nurses and still more nurses! Is the call from the American army in France. Surgeon General Gorgas is urging young women to begin the training courses to fit them for service at the front, or at least to take the places of nurses who go to the front, where 30,000 are needed.

"The need for nurses will not end with the declaration of peace," his department points out. "Therefore, those who begin the course of training are insured of employment in the future as well as doing a patriotic service now. The number of new students in the schools throughout the country should be limited only by their facilities, to teach and the clinical facilities of the hospitals."

In this connection it is recalled that Surgeon General Gorgas had an experience with nurses when he was in charge of sanitation in the Panama Canal zone that may be duplicated in France. It was found extremely difficult to keep nurses in Panama because the American men there married them almost as fast as they came!

"The epidemic of matrimony," as it was called in Panama, is likely to break out in France. However, both nurses and soldiers are over there strictly on business with the Kaiser, and if romances did they will not flower until peace is declared. Students are at no expense for tuition, board, laundry, lodging, uniforms, etc., and information about where to enroll for the training courses may be obtained from any Red Cross chapter.
