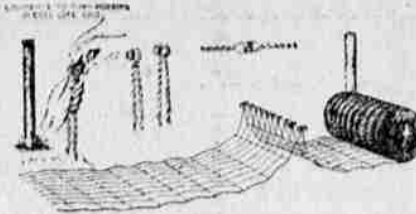

RED CROSS News and Notes.

YOUR RED CROSS

How the Red Cross helps to maintain French morale is told by Leroy T. Vernon, in the Chicago Daily News. Mr. Vernon says:

"Americans who contribute to the work of the American Red Cross in Europe today constitute the army of the United States on the fighting front in France. They are not lying in the trenches, they are not firing a gun, they are not flying in the air, but they are helping France to do all these things until the army of the United States can take its place in force on the firing line."

"The manifestations of sympathy and sincerity which the American people as a whole show to France through the Red Cross, raise in proportion the morale of the French army and the French people. Thus the Red Cross is, for the time being, the bridge over which the United States is pouring its money and its help until such a time as it can lift at least a part of the burden of actual war off the shoulders of the French nation."

"The suggestion frequently has been made that the American Red Cross is doing and attempting to do many things in France which ought to be done by the government of the United States. This overlooks the fact that while the Red Cross primarily is organized to give relief on a large scale, it is also the best medium yet devised for rendering international assistance, not under the guise of charity, but with a full understanding that nations as well as individuals, though sorely wounded and tried, can have pride, and that official assistance by one government to another may not be nearly as effective as the voluntary offerings of the whole people of the United States to France."

"There is a peculiar psychological factor in giving and receiving assistance which must always be reckoned with. In this instance it is the firm belief of the Red Cross of France that in amalgamating and coordinating nearly all of the private agencies conducting relief in France before the United States went to war, and in cooperating with the French government and such other organizations in France and elsewhere doing the same form of relief work, more is being done and can be done for the relief of France and the upkeep of France than through straight governmental aid."

"The employees referred to include train crews, blacksmiths and helpers, machinists and helpers, millwrights and helpers, engineers (donkey, locomotive and stationary), firemen, all foremen, sorting chain-

men, watchmen, cooks and camp helpers, scalers, car repair men, filers, sawyers, planing mill set-up men, head boom men, and others employed by the month.

"The eight hour restriction shall not be understood as prohibiting necessary repair work, opening up a track, loading cars or ships when departure of same requires immediate action or other work, which frequently is necessary and reasonable to render it possible to carry on the general operation without interruption."
