give; in fact, a full will consciousness is rapidly gripping the populace. There seems to be plenty of all these ingredients, committees find, but they are concerned over the source of funds. From what financial circles and business men can learn the next liberty loan will drag, if it does, through lack of available money, rather than from any other cause. High cost of living, frequent calls for philanthropic work and scores of other items, have drained the public of ready money with which to buy bonds, for the public hasn't yet grasped the importance of thrift. This thought is the reflection of what those who are managing the pre-campaign propaganda have come to feel.

In thrift alone lies the solution, they feel. Union county's share is large—so is every county's share. This fact is always remembered, but, likewise, the answer stands out prominently, to. The answer is thrift.

Save Pennies, Plea

Save a dollar here, and another there; 50 cents now and as much some other time—that is the way it will be brought about. The committee leaders have computed how it is possible for the average wage earner to buy a bond in just a few weeks, comparatively, through retrenchment of the luxuries with which they have heretofore surrounded themselves.

Have a Beginning Ready

And, another big plea the workers make is to harness oneself to the thrift practice right now that there may be a nucleus to pay down on the bond when it is bought. The rank and file of the population will have to put this third bond issue over—and that score all seem to agree—and if that element does it, it follows as the night the day that the rank and file must exercise a most rigid thriftiness in order to accumulate the necessary money.
