RED CROSS News and Notes.

For Belgian Relief. Answer to questions that may arise concerning collection of garments by Red Cross before March 25, 1918: Is this an authorized Red Cross activity? Answer: Yes, until March 25th, 1918, under the regulations prescribed. It is an act of co-operation with the Commission for Relief in Belgium undertaken by the Red Cross as the result of a direct request made to Mr. Davidson by Mr. Hoover.

How are we to explain this demand when the statement has so often been made that the Red Cross does not want worn clothing? Answer: The Red Cross does not want worn clothing because the Red Cross has no way whatever of sending such clothing abroad. In this case the Belgian Relief Commission has provided room on its own ships to transport this badly-needed clothing. The Red Cross has simply loaned its organization for this collection. After the collection has been made the Red Cross will have no use for worn clothing.

How shall expense of collection be met? Answer: Expense should be very light. Collection should cost very little; storage, little or nothing; packing, very little. If there is unavoidable expense for cartage, packing, loading, etc., keep it to the minimum and audit as a regular Chapter expense, paying from general fund. The privilege of making this collection for the Relief Commission gives the Red Cross the opportunity to have a part in a great and necessary war time work on a basis that entails very little expense to the Chapter and gives every Red Cross member a chance to co-operate in the actual work. How large a collection is to be made? Answer: At least 5,000 tons in the United States, 200 tons from this Division.

Should our Chapter endeavor to exceed its allotment? Answer: No. Can the Junior Red Cross help in this work? Answer: Yes. With the consent of the school authorities the Chairman of the Chapter School Committee should volunteer the entire force of the Juniors in this effort for such work as they may properly do.

Where will the clothing go? Answer: To the suffering people of occupied Belgium and Northern France.

Are baby clothes needed? Answer: Women have been turned away by the thousands from the empty storehouses of the Belgian Relief Committee, and their new born babies are swaddled in rags. Upon us rests the responsibility for the lives of these babies. Where will the clothing go? Answer: To the suffering people of occupied Belgium and Northern France.
