THE FORUM

Science of Navigation.

LA GRANDE, March 15.—(Editor of Observer.)—In last night's Observer there was a very interesting article on the science of navigation and how a ship's position is found at sea by the sextant and chronometer, etc. But the writer failed to mention the fact that an expert navigation is practically independent of his chronometer which is not always reliable, and therefore a master navigator can by combined observations of the moon and the sun or the moon and a fixed star find the correct time at Greenwich and the ship. Simultaneously, he can also find his position at sea by the stars or planets. The writer's statement that it is considered good navigation to come within about three miles of the truth proves that he is not a navigator and such an assertion is very misleading. I have witnessed a much better landfall than that after sailing for 18,000 miles without seeing land and then discovered the object aimed for not a thousand yards off. A commander of a ship who cannot make sure of his position inside of half a mile is not worthy of command.

MOTOR CAR IS "HERO" AT FIRE

Sedan First Draws Snow-Stalled Hose Cart, Then Hook-and-Ladder to Burning House.

Realism in the window display of Dodge Brothers sedan at Skaneateles, N. Y., was instrumental in getting badly needed fire fighting apparatus through deep-drifted snow and saving a burning home.

When the alarm sounded, just after a heavy fall of snow, about 30 men began to drag one of the town's hose wagons toward the scene of the fire. A little of this was sufficient to convince them all that man-power would not do the trick. Appeal was made to the Dodge Brothers dealer. It so happened that he had a sedan on display in the window, all ready to run.

In a moment the sedan was started. Ten minutes later the firemen had a stream of water on the fire, the motor car having pulled the hose cart through the snow without any difficulty.

Then it was driven back to the home house, where it hooked up to the hook-and-ladder truck and trundled it down to the fire.

The situation was more or less ironical because the town had decided, during the previous summer, not to add a 75-horsepower motor truck to its fire equipment, many believing such a truck would be helpless in the winter snows.—Adv. 5-9-18.
