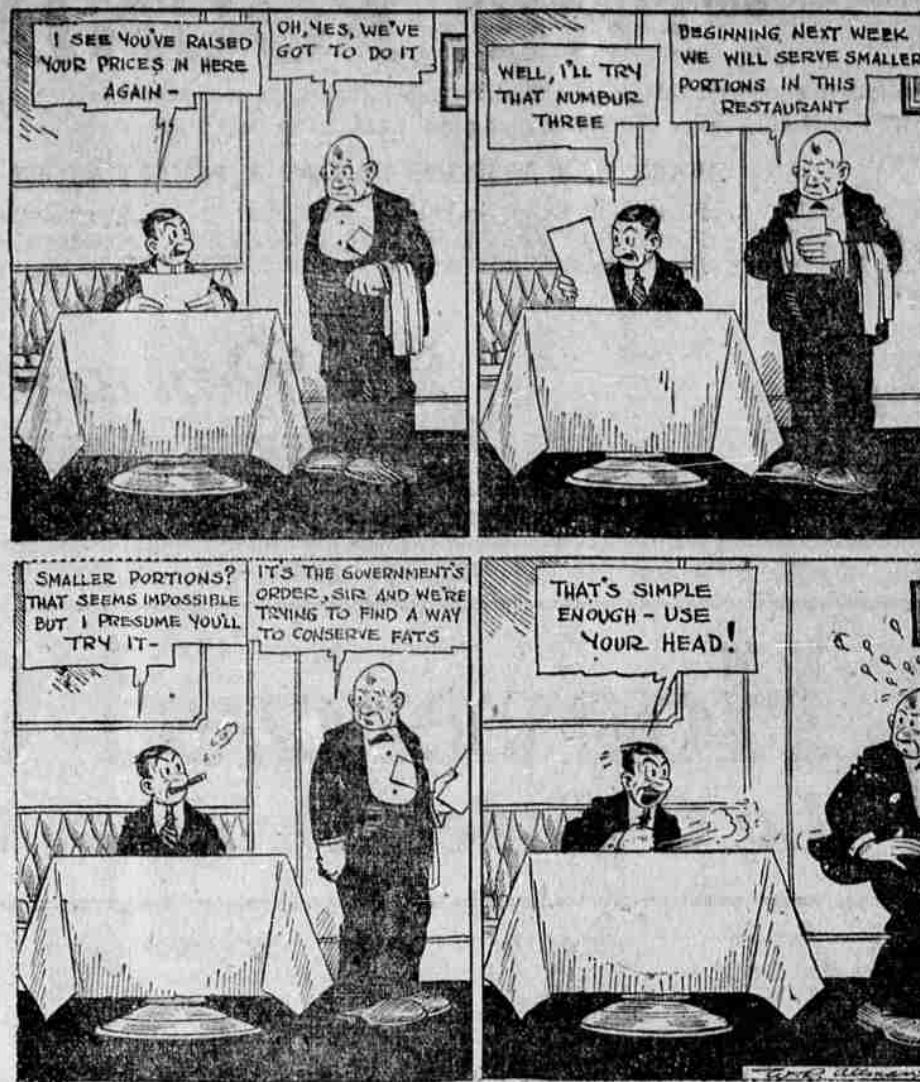

PORTLAND CATTLE MARKET.

Good Supply And Firm Prices Features Of Past Week.

PORTLAND, March 16.—There has been a very good supply of well finished cattle in the yards this week and the buying contin-

gent has met the situation with a 25c to 50c raise all along the line. The supply has been something beyond 2000 head for the week. Best steers are still quoted at \$10.50 to \$11.50. Good to medium steers \$9.50 to \$10.50; common to good well finished cattle in the yards \$8.50 to \$9.75; choice cows and

good cows and heifers \$8 to \$9.50; canners \$4.25 to \$6.25; bulls \$5 to \$9; calves \$7.50 to \$12; stockers and feeders \$6.50 to \$9.50.

Hog receipts today were nominal with the week's run totaling 4200 head. This week has shown up a little better in receipt than last week. Quality of hogs continues only ordinary, indicating that shippers are anxious sellers. The demand is very good and anything that will pass muster as a prime hog gets in on a good strong price. Quotations have been a little less than some of the actual sales. They are generally quoted at \$16.85 to \$17 for prime lights; prime heavies \$16.50 to \$16.85; plus \$14 to \$15.25; bulk \$16.85 to \$16.90.

Sleep receipts have been fairly good for the week, most of them, however, not being on the open market. All stuff that has been offered for sale has gone at good strong prices and there is a marked tone of strength in the lambs. The general quotations are as follows: Western lambs \$15 to \$15.50; val-
