## FOOD WILL WIN THE WAR

### Andrew Marker Writes on War

In a letter to Major E. H. Coolidge, Capt. Andrew R. Marker writes:

Camp Lewis, Jan. 12, 1918.

Dear Friend:

Your letter of the second instant received and read with pleasure. The kind things you say relative to myself are much appreciated; it is a pleasant thing to know that we hold the good opinion of one whose regard is precious, even though modestly forbids us to think that it is entirely deserved.

I trust this new year 1918 will be a great and propitious one for you and that it may be, also, one of the most illustrious and epochal years in the annals of the world's history. It begins in darkness and shadow, the saddest year, perhaps, the world has known since the assassination of the Prince of Peace. I am sure it is the prayer of every American heart that this great way may be fought to a successful conclusion this year, so that when a new year comes again we may be able to say with the poet:

"Out of the shadows of night  
The world rolls into light—  
It is daybreak everywhere."

But whether this fearful struggle is ended this year, or next year, or even the year following, I earnestly hope that America may be imbued with an inflexible determination to fight on until it is finished and finished right—finished for all time—until the mighty structure of Prussian Autocracy is overthrown and this mad German Emperor buried beneath its appalling ruins.

I do not indulge myself in any

foolish hope that the war will be ended without any costly sacrifice on our part. I am convinced that Germany is still a fearfully formidable foe. It will require the concentrated resources of the nation—men, money and material, laid ungrudgingly upon the altar in a supreme sacrifice, backed by an unalterable determination to win at any cost.

I have a profound faith in the great mass of the American people, but the little pop-gun politicians make me sick with apprehension. The great Allied drive—"the battle of 1917"—that began so brilliantly and was fought with so much promise of a decisive victory, was balked and thwarted by political interference from the French chamber of deputies. The promised fruits of that great movement were nullified and lost by a coterie of swivel-chair civilians who insisted on running the army. I wonder if we have yet learned the terrible lesson of the first disastrous years of the Civil War? God give us another supreme military leader of the guts and genius and granite composition of "unconditional surrender Grant."

I really wonder at times if a peace-loving volatile people like the American people, accustomed as they are to comfort and high living can bring themselves to that "blood and iron" frame of mind that will take them through fire and hell, deprivation, suffering—that delirium of heroism that encounters despair and death and is blind to the odds? God grant that America—history's noblest effort in behalf of free gov-

ernment—may not fall in this solemn testing time!  
It is inconceivable to me, of course, that Germany can win this war. My mind is suffocated and lost when I abandon the bright idea of liberty. If she is to win—if the ruthless Hun is to dominate the world—then I want to die "over there" and be buried with face down in "the tongueless silence of the dreamless dual."

But even if the Hun does conquer the world, how little he can conquer. He cannot even master his own wanton and brutal passions; he can never make himself a gentleman. He can kill the body; he can lay waste to beautiful cities; he can spread suffering, devastation and horror; he can never kill the spirit. If a beaten race survives it remains a factor in life. If it exterminated, the conquering nation cannot escape the inexorable reckoning.

Germany's spirit will reflect his cruel conduct; will be nursed by every unjust wound it inflicts; she will be chained by the manacles she fastens on her prisoners, will be seared by her ferocities, blasted by her ruthless passion, blood-poisoned by her wanton fury.

In the end she will be the nightmare of history.  
In the end all that survives is blood. The despised Jew had no country for nearly 2,000 years, but the Jew had an idea and the Jew has lived and prospered. His idea was man's duty and relationship to God has not so much been written as ploughed into the conscience of humanity. The Greeks ended centuries ago as a political power, but the Greek ideas of heroism, art, literature, liberty and beauty still
