#### Old-Fashioned Cornmeal Pudding

Pour four cups scalded milk over one-third cup cornmeal and cook in a double boiler twenty minutes, add one-half cup molasses, one tablespoonful butter or chopped suet, one teaspoonful salt, one teaspoonful either ground ginger or cinnamon, one-half cup seed-corn raisins, and one pint cold milk into which has been beaten the yolks of two eggs. Pour into a greased dish. Bake slowly two hours. It should have considerably whey when baked. This whey is used as a sauce when serving the pudding, which may be eaten hot or cold.
