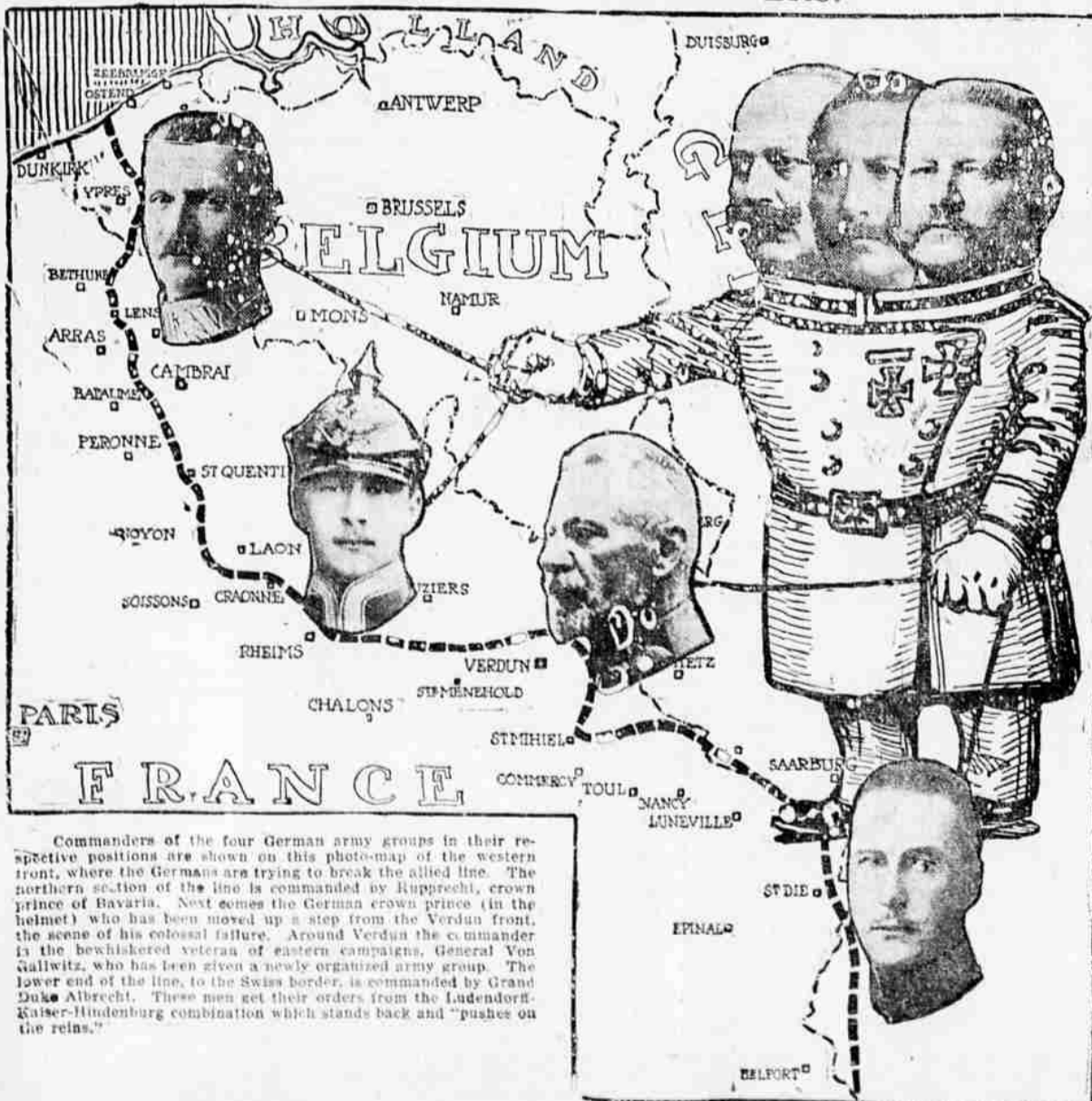

## THE DRIVE AND THE DRIVERS!



Commanders of the four German army groups in their respective positions are shown on this photo-map of the western front, where the Germans are trying to break the allied line. The northern section of the line is commanded by Rupprecht, crown prince of Bavaria. Next comes the German crown prince (in the helmet) who has been moved up a step from the Verdun front, the scene of his colossal failure. Around Verdun the commander is the bewhiskered veteran of eastern campaigns, General Von Gallwitz, who has been given a newly organized army group. The lower end of the line, to the Swiss border, is commanded by Grand Duke Albrecht. These men set their orders from the Ludendorff-Kaiser-Hindenburg combination which stands back and "pushes on the reins."
