HERMAN ROTHCHILD HOME FROM HOSPITAL

NORTH POWDER, March 27.—(Special)—Mrs. Anna Wicks, a well known lady of this section, is lying very ill at her home in the Wolfe Creek section about one mile from the city. Mrs. Wicks was in town on Saturday afternoon and seemed as well as ever but was stricken on Sunday with a severe attack of heart trouble. Convulsions came on and a physician was summoned who relieved her a little but it seemed as if she was so ill that she was almost past help. She is reported as resting some easier today but has not been able to take either food or water. Mrs. Wicks has not been well for a long time as she was very sick last spring with heart trouble and it is feared that she may not recover. Her friends hope that she may again rally from this attack.

H. A. Boyle, who died in La Grande on March 22, was at one time a well known resident of North Powder. He and his family left here in December and moved to Payette. He seemed to have contracted pneumonia in Payette. He never regained his strength and fell an easy victim to the disease that took his life. He leaves a wife and an eight year old daughter to mourn his loss besides brothers and sisters. The bereaved family have the sympathy of their friends in their sad bereavement.

Two cars of sheep and lambs were shipped from North Powder on Monday morning.

When one looks on that flag it is with a swelling heart and tear-dimmed eyes of the brave young fellows that have gone to their country's call.

Julius Chenault has returned to North Powder after an absence of some years. Mr. Chenault left here some time ago and lived in Free-water for some years but is now back and will make his future home here. He will go into the cattle business.

Ed Davis had a severe accident recently from and explosion of carbide gas. He was examining the plant that supplies the house with light by the light of a lantern when the gas caught on fire and severely burned him about the face and hands.

Olin Hadley, principal of the North Powder high school, has applied for a position with the Red Cross in France and expects to go over soon. Mr. Hadley is well liked and the best wishes of pupils and friends will go with him in his work wherever it may be.

Several of the pupils are dropping out to help in the spring work. Ralph York is one of them but he has enough credits already so will graduate with his class.

The scarlet fever patients are out of quarantine and school has opened again. It is reported that

the measles and mumps are around but it seems that no attention is paid to them. People do not seem to realize that even these little diseases are very dangerous and should be strictly quarantined.

Report has it that John Dahlstrom has taken his brother's place in the first class and that Paul will now be placed in class four. The Dahlstrom Bros. have been running their mother's farm for some years and have done fine with it.

Mark Robison and family left last week for Stanfield where they will make their future home. Mr. Robison purchased a farm in that section a short time ago.
