With the Colors

(From Herbert A. McGinnis.)
The following letter is from a former high school boy, who among his fellow students was familiarly known as "Fat" McGinnis. The missive is to his cousin, Miss Mazine Workman:
Somewhere in France, March 1. —My Dear Old Friend and Cousin: —Will drop you a line today to let you know I am still alive and managing to kick.
We are located in a different place than we were the last time I wrote you. Am up nearer the front than we were at that time. Nothing unusual for a big shell to come along and tear off a corner of our dugout. Get to see an air battle when I want to—only three or four every day.
Saw an airplane burn up in the

sky the other day. It sure was a sight. I don't think he was hit by a shell but it looked as if his tank exploded and set the plane on fire. He went straight toward the earth and I could see nothing but a cloud of black smoke. When he was, I should judge, 1000 feet from the earth the smoke ceased and the plane went straight to the earth. When the plane was burning he came toward the earth in a sort of zig-zag course but when it stopped burning, the plane just seemed to turn straight downward and went out of sight, from me behind a forest.
We are located now in a French Evacuation hospital. The wounded men come in from the trenches every day, with all wounds imag-

inable.
We are in a city of about 5000, and this town was in the hands of the Germans during the first year of the war. One of the largest battles of the war was fought in a little village just next to us, which I have been in and nothing is left but the ruins. This little village was taken and retaken seven different times in one day.
By the way when I pass nearly every day the Germans lined up 150 of the inhabitants, consisting of old men, women and children and shot them down. In a hospital here in town there is a young woman of about 23 years of age with her right leg cut off at the thigh, which the Germans done as a punishment. A person can't imagine the barbaric things the Germans done here at that time. There is a little Irish nurse here in the hospital and she can relate incidents that will make

a man shiver. Don't know how long we will be located here but maybe for the rest of the war.

Say I am going to see if I can send some lace home and if I can will send you some. Mother wrote me asking for some and I don't see why I couldn't. We are allowed to tell about everything with the exceptions where we are located and are not to mention the names of any place we have been.
Will close for this time and write again soon.
