WAR SCENES IN "OVER THERE" TECHNICALLY CORRECT.

"Over There," which will be shown next Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the Arcade theatre, is notable for its war scenes, which must take rank with the very best war scenes produced outside of the actual fighting lines. The battle areas in this picture are unusually extensive, and the construction of the trench system was costly. For instead of the usual fox holes and trenches and ambush, hundreds of feet are covered by a really confusing system of counter trench work.

There trenches were constructed under the supervision of Lieutenant W. A. O'Hara, of the 24th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, who spent seven months in the first line trenches in Northern France, and who actively participated in the battles of the Somme from Ypres to Vimy. Lieutenant O'Hara also supervised and ably assisted in the making of the highly effective battle scenes. No picture which has yet been shown to the American public so graphically duplicates the scene conditions of a battle on the west front as this

POLITICAL RUBBLING.

Senatorial Fight Is Between McNary and Stanfield.

PORTLAND, March 30.—Despite the war situation and the impending Liberty Loan drive, politics are beginning to bubble and boil. Chief interest centers in the governorship and senatorial fight.

In the senatorial race the fight is between Stanfield and McNary with the betting getting pretty close on account of the popularity of Stanfield and the fact that he is the only candidate for senator who is not a lawyer. Eighty per cent of the National Congress is lawyers; every member of the Oregon delegation in Washington is a lawyer and every candidate for the nomination is a lawyer excepting Stanfield. The further fact that the administration is calling for the services of practical business men is another argument in Stanfield's favor, for he is acknowledged to be one of the biggest, brainiest business men of the state and almost sure to be a winner.

For some time it looked like wool was going to be the issue in the senatorial campaign, but when it was shown beyond question that the wool grower received only from 40 to 65 cents a pound for his wool, and the consumers and knitters have to pay from \$4.50 to \$7 a pound for yarn, the charge of profiteering on the part of the wool growers fell flat. This put it up to manufacturers and State Treasurer Kay rushed into print to show that the manufacturers were not profiteering. Who is the profiteer hasn't been decided as the question is still being persistently discussed in Portland papers, but they all agree that the wool grower is the under dog because while expenses have gone up by leaps and bounds, the price remains stationary and he cannot sell his wool on account of the lack of transportation. He is being gradually squeezed to the wall.
