Hitchkiss, who has two brothers in the service, came all the way from Alaska to enlist.

His distinguished uncle, Benjamin Hitchkiss, born in Watertown, Conn., in 1826, was one of the first to adopt the principle of using explosive gas developed by firing to assist the operation of rapid-fire guns. All modern machine guns now employ this principle.

Many of the inventor's improvements in projectiles and heavy ordnance were accepted by the American Government and are now in use. Hitchkiss afterwards went to Paris, where he established a gun factory. He died there in 1885.
