WAR SAVINGS ORGANIZED.

La Grande Stands at Head of Lath-
ans in Northwest.

At a meeting held at the home of Rev. F. W. Bussard last night, a Lutheran war savings society was organized with fifteen charter members by members and friends of Zion Lutheran Church. Rev. Bussard was elected president and Mr. George Schaller, Secretary. The Society will meet regularly on the last Tuesday evening of each month.

In the recent campaign of the National Lutheran War Commission for \$750,000 for Soldiers' and Sailors' Welfare, the La Grande congregation stands at the head of the list of all the churches in the Northwest, having raised five times the quota allotted to it by the Commission.

For the information of those who helped in this campaign in our community, Rev. Bussard reports that the nation total received to date for this work among our boys with the colors amounts to more than \$1,200,000, or 68 per cent in excess of the sum asked for.
