The committee feels that the matter is really trifling and but a minor part of the sacrifices we are asked to make. Grocers, meat shops, retail establishments—every business of any kind will close at 7 Saturday evening if we are to do our patriotic duty as other communities meet them.

Mr. Grain Farmer:

Are you prepared to handle your grain in bulk? Do not wait until Spring and Summer when you are buried with work and worried with labor shortage, but build your granaries now.
