**LEGAL ADVICE IS FREE.**

War Risks and Other Matters of the Kind Will Receive Attention

The legal advisory board of Union county comprised of Attorneys John P. Rusk, chairman; Robert Eakin and C. R. Eberhard, desire to again announce through the press of the county that in the matter of the dependents of soldiers and sailors making application for benefits under the war risk insurance law and any other rights they may have there is absolutely no necessity for employing an agent or attorney. Such applications are most simple and the government is more than anxious to afford to every one entitled the full benefits of the law. Members of the board of lawyers generally throughout the county will be glad to assist without charge or fees of any kind all such dependents.

Should any attorney be so unpatriotic as to charge for such services, it is requested that the name of such person be handed or sent into the board when such person so making a charge or taking a fee will be properly dealt with. This

announcement is made at the direction of both the United States government and of the American Bar association.

The legal advisory board wish also to again announce that its members and all other lawyers have been called upon to assist free of charge all soldiers and sailors in winding up their business affairs and in securing their rights before being inducted into the army.
