SLACKERS TO BE PUT TO WORK

(Continued from Page One) listing local boards virtually as employment agencies for their districts. When a man was informed that he must seek a useful occupation he would be told where just such a man as his questionnaire shows him to be needed.

That determined opposition to the plan will develop in some quarters has been foreseen. The effect upon the labor market of the addition of many thousands of able-bodied workers might act to reduce the present wage scales.

The economic balance will be kept even, however, according to the champions of the program, by the reduction in the cost of life's necessities through increased output.

Wilson Withholds Statement. No indication has been given of the attitude which President Wilson will take, though Army officials are confident he will give his approval.

The War Department is forging ahead with its efforts to speed additional American forces across the water to back up the beleaguered lines. One element of the speed-up plans was learned authoritatively. The first increment of the second draft, to be summoned this month, will be 150,000 men, instead of 50,000, as previously planned. They will be the first considerable force mobilized of the 800,000 drafted men to be called to the colors this year.

The remaining 650,000 men would be called out in monthly increments the size of which will depend to some extent upon availability of shipping to transport men already in training to the front.

There are indications that troop movements toward the seaboard of unusual proportions are already in progress. Railway, passenger and freight schedules in some sections of the country have been set aside temporarily in order to give the men right of way to embarkation points.

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RED CROSS NOTES.

Use of Name or Emblem in Connection with Division of Profits with American Red Cross

We wish to again call your attention to the general rules upon this subject to be used as a guide.

1. No offers should be accepted contemplating a division of profits between the promoters and the Red Cross. This rule applies to the manufacture and sale of merchandise or articles of any kind, as well as to entertainments.

2. No one should be permitted to promote or advertise an entertainment or like function as a Red Cross entertainment, sale or benefit, unless the management or control is entirely in the hands of the Red Cross Chapter.

3. If, after due investigation, other persons offering to conduct benefit entertainments are found to be entirely reliable and acting in good faith, they may be permitted to make announcement in the press or otherwise, of their intention to donate the proceeds of the entertainment to the Red Cross. But the entertainment should not be advertised as a Red Cross benefit or Red Cross entertainment nor any wording used in the announcements that would lead the public to believe that it is being given under the auspices of the Red Cross, or that the Red Cross in any way connected with or responsible for its management.

4. A chapter is authorized to permit the use of the emblem or name in advertising an entertainment, only when the entire entertainment is actually managed and controlled by, and the entire proceeds are paid to, the Red Cross chapter.

It is important that each individual case upon this subject should be decided with tact and diplomacy by the Chapter Head on the ground. We ask your cooperation in these matters.
