INFAMOUS MISREPRESENTATION

Will Senator Charlie McNary's workers continue to circulate scurrilous typewritten, unsigned untruths longer about Bob Stanfield hoarding wool? Will they continue to slip into a Red Cross gathering and whisper the reason yarn is so high priced is because Bob Stanfield has a corner on all the wool and is holding it for a high price? Will they?

Bob Stanfield for the SECOND time has wired the United States government to take his wool. He first wired the war department when war was declared by this country, as did many other Oregon sheepmen, to take all the wool for the army at whatever price the government saw fit.

But in the face of this act—an act by the way which McNary and none of the Salem-McNary contingent have not met with any offered sacrifice for their country—the McNaryites have chosen to grovel in the old stunts of Salem politics and lashed their bulletins and word of mouth utterances in an attempt at a time like this to undermine and ruin if possible a patriotic man whose magnanimous Eastern Oregon spirit prompted him before the ink was dry on President Wilson's war declaration to offer what he had to help his country.

It is time for Oregon to awaken and put an end to cess-pool Salem methods. It is time to put the ban on the "holier than thou" claps whose chief art lies in the double cross, whose political trickeries have been shielded by legal standing and whose lack of respect for truth should be known to the entire state.

so ago, says Editor Piper in the Oregonian. Ezekiel's recipe for war bread on that occasion was described in the words: "Take thou also unto thee wheat, barley and beans, and lentils, and millet, and fitches, and put them into one vessel and make thee bread thereof." All of the grains mentioned are common enough nowadays, except "fitches," which Bible students translate both as "vetches" and an "spelt," inclining to accept the latter as the grain meant by Ezekiel. Either, however, would have had life-sustaining qualities. Spelt is a species of wheat characterized by grains which are held tightly within the chaff and are not hulled out by threshing. It is still grown in parts of Europe where the soil is too poor for wheat, but not in America, where the grain commonly known by that name is really emmer.

A HOPEFUL SIGN.

The news reports today tell of a gigantic propaganda which the German militarists have undertaken to create dissension in the armies of the allies. This is their strident suit, but it will fail and even prove less alarming than the attempts in Mexico and Japan. It is much less harmful than the work that has been allowed to go on in behalf of imperialism in our own country. It is a hopeful sign, since it is tacitly a recession from the German belief that the big drive begun two weeks or more ago and so announced by the Kaiser "as the last supreme trial of strength," would be the crushing blow.

According to the report received a part of the lying propaganda was intended to deceive the German people as well as the soldiers of the allies. This feature of the case is almost pitiful. The Germans were told that the war program of America was a failure.

While this sounds a little like the German propagandists have heard something about the speeches in congress, it will be the deluded German people more than the allies that will suffer from this deception. The German soldiers and the German people are being sacrificed to further the ambition of the German military power. It all comes under the general head of German junketeering stupidity. This latest discovery shows that another mistake has been added to the series.

When such tactics are considered necessary it begins to strengthen the belief that the expectation of a prolonged war is still a miscalculation and that it may be brought to an end within the year.

Germany has concluded peace with Russia but at the same time has been compelled to surrender Odessa, the wheat center. On the other hand Germany is not evacuating the territory occupied before the peace was ratified and is holding territory occupied since that time. The Brest-Litovsk peace must be the kind "that passeth all understanding."

ENTERPRISE, April 6.—(Special.)

The drive for bonds in Wallowa county started Saturday and there are three days of holiday. The quota of \$54,350 for Enterprise has already been pledged.
