Kameka has been active in all war efforts which may be seen by the following:

On St. Patrick's day the newly organized auxiliary to the La Grande Chapter of the Red Cross gave a benefit dance at which \$55 was cleared. On the 27th of March a war savings society was organized here with 15 members which in less than a week had increased to 69 members. Our school children in the sale of their war savings stamps under the able direction of the teacher, Mr. N. A. Cramer, has been three in the first Rainbow regiment, two in the second regiment and two so far in the third regiment and several others working. Their total sales to date have been \$522.56.

Select Food From Group Daily. (From Federal Food Administration.) You should choose daily some food from each of the five following groups:

1. Vegetables and fruits.
2. Milk, eggs, fish, meat, cheese, beans, peas, peanuts.
3. Cereals—corn meal, oatmeal, rice, bread, etc.
4. Sugar, syrups, jelly, honey, etc.
5. Fats—butter, margarine, cottonseed oil, olive oil, drippings, suet.

Every food eaten may be put into one of these groups, and any food may be exchanged for another in the same group. For example, oatmeal may be used instead of wheat, and eggs or sometimes beans, instead of "meat." Food "is" needed from each group every day. Don't skip any.

Keep Your Eye On Amiens



Why is the aim of the great German drive Amiens and not Paris, which fact is clearly indicated by their strategy? As already stated Amiens is the great railroad center of the English army, connecting by direct, straight railroad line with the French ports of Calais and Boulogne. Amiens taken the English would be compelled to use a more roundabout route, also making use of the ports of Havre and Dieppe which, in some ways would be a deadly blow. Tremendous work would have to be done to make Havre and Dieppe as efficient military ports as Calais and Boulogne. Once in Amiens, Hindenburg would be in a position, by the sacrifice of troops, to march towards the channel shores, so as to cut off Calais and Boulogne. In no time Calais and Boulogne would be converted into nests for submarines, just as Ostend and Zeebrugge are.
