### FEDERAL LAND BANK IS IN PROSPEROUS CONDITION

Turner Oliver, Registrar and Attorney, Gives Interesting Facts.

Turner Oliver, former La Grande resident and now registrar and attorney for the Federal Land bank of Spokane, writes the Observer some interesting facts regarding the success of the institution. Among other things, Mr. Oliver says that the bank is closing loans at the rate of about \$2,000,000 per month. The farmers of Union county have received a goodly number of loans but all who are eligible under the law and who need money should avail themselves of getting it at the low rate of interest and easy terms afforded by the Federal Land bank. The bank is now taking care of loans as rapidly as titles are approved, and none of the abstracts are held up longer than three or four days, so this part of the bank's affairs is being handled expeditiously.

Incidentally, the country is now seeing the wisdom of the Federal Reserve system of banking. Were it not for that system it would be impossible for the country to finance the tremendous requirements of the great war, but with it it is possible to take care of a three billion dollar or five billion dollar loan immediately without any serious parting on the financial system of the country.

The result of the first year's work of the Spokane institution is summed up by Mr. Oliver as follows: Loans applied for, 17,333. Amount applied for, \$43,233,213. Farms appraised and reorted on, 11,820. Loans approved, 9,198. Aggregate of loans approved \$20,748,170. Loans rejected, 2622, aggregating \$5,633,745. Titles approved and mortgages drawn, 6323. Loans paid, 5425, aggregating \$12,615,965. National farm loan associations organized and chartered, 344. Farm loan bonds authorized, \$11,750,000. Capital Nearly Doubled.

In a year the capital has increased from \$750,000 to \$1,382,742 through the stock subscriptions of each borrower, equivalent to 5 per cent of his loan. When the

capital reaches \$1,500,000 the bank starts to pay off to the government its original capital of \$750,000, as provided for in the law, and ultimately all stock will be owned by the borrowers.

### STOCK ON THE RANGE IS REPORTED DOING WELL.

In some of the localities up the river, horses have been on the range for considerable time, in fact in many of the southern exposed hillsides some animals have been out all winter. In the past week a great many cattle have been taken by the farmers to the hills. In most cases stock is doing well.

Various residents of the Flat who are grazing horses and cattle on the Minam range, visited the range last week in reply to a rumor that ticks were endangering the stock, the Elgin Recorder reports. The men rode for several days and found all their horses and cattle in excellent condition. At the "new" cabin, which is located about five miles below the forks of the Minam, they found one cow that had been killed by ticks and several others in bad condition, but these are said to belong to parties at Cove and were poor when turned on the range.

Cattle and horses belonging to local stockmen were in the best of condition when turned on the range this spring and consequently are doing well.
