CHILDREN'S YEAR EFFORTS.

Plans Are Being Perfected To Reduce Infant Mortality.

Mrs. Schilke is in receipt of a letter from the American Red Cross department of civilian relief, enclosing a copy of a letter which W. Frank Parsons, director general of civilian relief, has sent to each of the 14 division directors, who are responsible for the supervision of home service work throughout the country, indorsing the program of the Children's Year as outlined by the chief of the children's bureau of the United States department of labor, for a country-wide effort for the reduction of infant mortality and the promotion of child welfare during the year beginning April

15, 1918, the anniversary of the declaration of war. This indorsement added to that of President Wilson unquestionably places this matter in the light of a national war issue. It is also expected that the governor of each state will indorse the movement.

Plans are being perfected whereby the work will soon be started in Oregon.

FOR COTTAGE CHEESE.

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 15. To encourage the use as well as the making of cottage cheese—a cheap and palatable substitute for meat—the United States Department of Agriculture has launched a campaign in which nearly a hundred field workers will take part and which is to carry to every State in the Union this lesson.

Cottage cheese is made from skim milk—now largely wasted or fed to animals. A pound of cottage cheese has the same food value as a pound of meat. Make cottage cheese, and thus get to valuable use wasted skim milk. Eat cottage cheese; save the meat for our soldiers and the Allies.

Three of the big divisions of the Department of Agriculture are working in this campaign, which also has the co-operation of the United States Food Administration.

"I fear," said Lloyd George, Britain's famous statesman, in a recent speech, "I fear the disciplined people behind the German army. I fear the rationed German family, and the determination of the German wife and sister and daughter and mother to stand and argue so that their fighting men may be fed—I fear it more than the Imperial German army itself."
