ORANGE CROP OUTLOOK.

Navel Supply But 15 Per Cent. While California Valencia Is Good.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 20.—Present abnormal prices of California navel oranges are explained in recent figures compiled by crop authorities. These figures show that only fifteen per cent of the normal navel crop of California came to maturity as a result of the heat wave last June, the most destructive in thirty years. As a result of the unusual heat, eighty-five per cent of the young navel fruit shriveled and dropped from the trees. The natural consequence has been larger oranges and a supply far below the demand and therefore higher than usual prices.

The truth is that there has not been anywhere near a normal supply of California oranges since the shipping season opened last November. They will not be on the market in abundance until the new shipping season opens in May.

The summer crop of California Valencia oranges promises to be good. Unless there is a setback in weather conditions or transportation facilities, the market will afford a bountiful supply of these practically seedless oranges from California at considerably lower prices.
