LOCAL ORGANIZATION DOING GOOD WORK

An organization and its work that is becoming more popular every day is the Union County Army and Navy Auxiliary. Brought into existence in the first place as an adjunct and aid to the La Grande Hospital unit, which by the way has members from all over the county, the Auxiliary has, with increased membership, broadened its field of labor and is now endeavoring to supply every Union county man called to the colors with the outfit necessary to start and assist him in army life. This outfit consists of sweater, housewife, ditty bag and socks, furnished at an individual cost, if labor were counted, of about \$5 each. The money to purchase the materials for making and filling the outfit, which includes scissors, thread, buttons, needles, pins and other accessories that will be needed by the soldier, comes from the general fund, and the method adopted to replenish this fund is through entertainments, donations and benefit occasions.

The Auxiliary also dispenses another fund, that of the mess fund

for the La Grande Hospital unit, and this fund will become more popular, now that the government has stopped the sending of large packages for the present, which practically puts an end to individual, or family efforts, to supply the unit with the little extras that go to make life more pleasant in France.

So for local purposes the Auxiliary is performing a splendid work; that of outfitting the Union county boys that start, and in a way doing what they can to take care of the Union county boys already there.

Membership in the Auxiliary is open to everyone, and all inclined to help in the lines here mentioned, are invited to get their names on the roll, so that officers can call upon them to sew and help in other ways to promote the work. Meeting nights are the first and third Mondays of each month, at 7:30 at the City Hall building. The present officers are Mrs. C. N. Palmer, president, and Mrs. J. J. Carr, secretary treasurer.
