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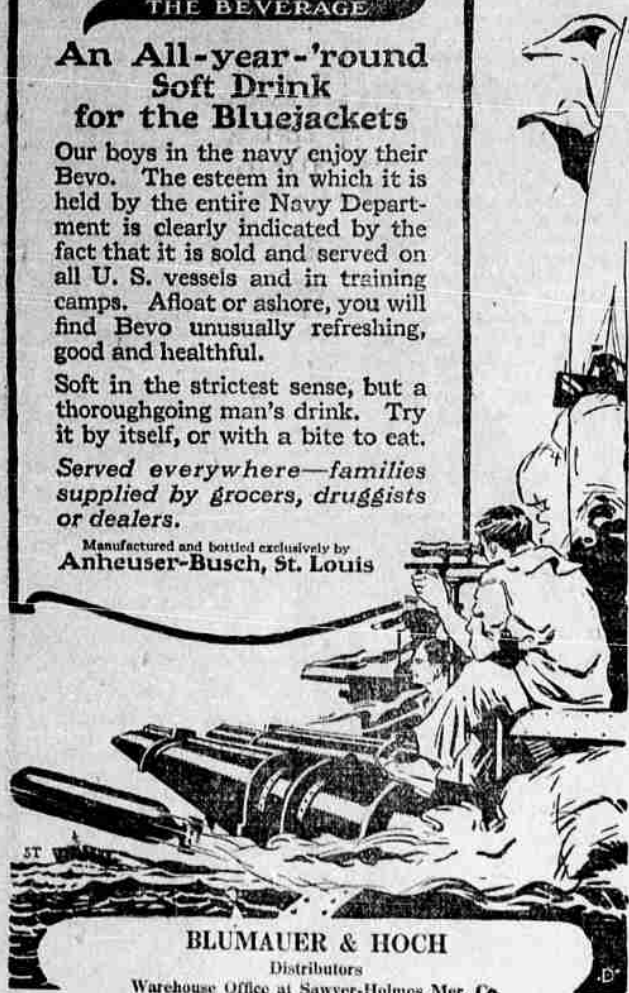

Bollons, for making it possible for the participants from La Grande to be with us. A dance and supper followed, which was much enjoyed by all.
