 TO THE HON. COMMISSION, CITY OF LA GRANDE, ORE, GENTLEMEN:

Following is my report for the week ending April 22, 1918:

Fire Chief reports no fires for the week.

Chief of Police reports three arrests for the week; drunk, 2; having liquor in possession, 1; number convicted, 3. Fines and forfeitures collected, \$65. Days worked prisoners on street, 5.

Water Superintendent reports total expenditure for labor in water and street departments, \$144, of which \$37.50 is charged to the water department and \$106.50 to the street department. This includes five days' labor of prisoners.

As per request of Commission, the Manager, Water Superintendent and Fire Chief looked over the territory mentioned in recent petition, asking that a fire hydrant be located at Sixth and "K," and also one at Fourth and "M." The one at Fourth and "M" protects the high school and central school, and is also available to the Court House and Catholic Church, and the one at Sixth and "K" protects the same property from another angle, and also gives protection to several residences north of Sixth street. We deem both necessary.

Have secured the final figures for estimated cost of material for proposed improvement at the reservoir and the same are herewith attached.

Water Superintendent has flushed all hydrants and drained all dead ends.

Following is the report of the City Recorder: Receipts, from fines, \$75; no licenses issued and no warrants drawn this week.

The City Treasurer reports as follows:

Receipts: From water rents, \$401.21; from imp. dist. interest, \$820.84; imp. dist. instalments, \$803; electrical permit, \$50; telephone franchise, \$68.28; dog licenses, \$18; total receipts, \$2,111.83.

Disbursements: For imp. dist. interest paid, \$60; water warrant paid, \$2.03; contingent warrant paid, \$3.90;

road warrant paid, \$28; total disbursements, \$66.18.
