

# J. GARFIELD KING

On May 1st, J. G. King, for two years secretary of the Y. M. C. A. here, leaves for France as secretary and athletic director with the allied armies. In the interim between now and then he and his family are preparing their household effects to be moved away. Mrs. King and children, planning to go to California while Mr. King is in France.

The record Mr. King has made during his stay in La Grande, are largely summed up in a resolution presented and adopted at the last Tuesday luncheon, in which a unanimous vote of approval was given by a rising vote. The resolution says:

"Whereas, J. G. King, a member of this gathering is soon to depart overseas to lend his moral and physical help toward the complete subjugation of the ruthless Hun, it is only meet and right that this body express for the citizenship generally, its interest in Mr. King's patriotic purpose."

"And whereas, we recall that in the temporary removal from our midst, we lose a potent and vital factor in numerous avenues of civic and patriotic life; we call to mind his efficiency and earnestness of application to his duties as our Y. M. C. A. general secretary; we recall how through untiring efforts and application of his skill and training, he has built up every branch of Y. M. C. A. functions to a high plane—athletics, community service, religious phases and educational and financial affairs, all have attained new heights of prominence and power under his direction; we further recall that since the war began he has served untiringly and with marked fairness to all, on the Union County Exemption board, doing his full share along with his colleagues in making this county one of the foremost in the state in all respects; we recall again that as secretary of the Union-Wallowa Counties' Fire Association he has played a big part in protecting our forests; we are further reminded that his willing hands and fertile brain have ever been up in front of all public and civic undertakings, from entertaining soldiers to promoting all sorts of worthy war drives; we do not forget that athletic laurels have been brought home to us by his physical prowess applied under La Grande Y. M. C. A. colors; that in view of these splendid traits and achievements, all needed to make a man who does big things, he has been of great value to the community. Therefore:

"Be it resolved that our appreciation of what he has done, and our faith in what he is about to undertake, be hereby publicly expressed by the adoption of this resolution, and that our best wishes for him and his splendid family be thus extended, and that we implore divine guidance and protection over him as he goes to the front.

Encomiums have been showered upon Mr. King since his decision to go abroad was reached. Some of those with whom he has worked are especially warm in their commendation. Here are some of them: Fred Currey, city manager; "J. Garfield King is a utility man—a man with service as his chief stripe of character. He has certainly been of service to the city."

G. L. Larison, chairman of the Union County War Board: "There is one thing about King, when ever you call on him for help he always responds and never disappoints you."

Lee Warnick, Sheriff, member of Union County Exemption Board: "Mr. King is a man of efficiency. His work on the board as its secretary was first-class always."

Lowell Williamson, former warden and now secretary of the Union County and Wallowa Counties Fire Association: "The harmony that existed between J. G. King, as Secretary Treasurer of the Union and Wallowa Forest Fire Association and the head warden and patrolmen of the association during the strenuous season last year, in a large measure contributed to the efficiency and willingness of the men to put their best efforts in fighting the various fires."

George T. Cochran, for the Y. M. C. A.: "In Y. M. C. A. work King always hits the nail on the head."

Fred J. Holmes: "I feel that in the departure of Mr. King the Y. M. C. A. in all its departments has lost a valuable man. He was always ready to help promote anything of interest or good to the entire people of this city. He was untiring in his earnestness and devotion to his every undertaking. In Red Cross work he was a valuable assistant. We will miss him when he is gone. I hope he will be pleased with the great work he is going to perform abroad."
