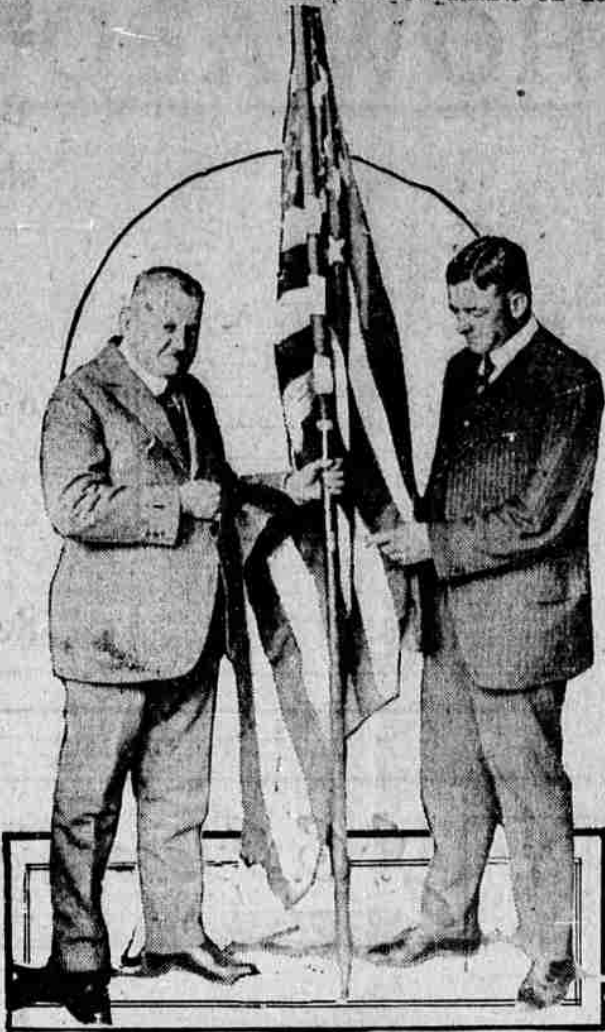
Clean up week is being observed in this city, and all yards, streets and alleys are ordered by the council to be cleaned. The streets of the city will be worked right away also.
