GET READY FOR THE WAR'S END

Oregon is one of the wonder communities in the galaxy of Pacific states. It is an empire in itself. Hereafter it has been noted for its fruits—and Oregon fruits are world-famous for quality, beauty and delicious flavor—but diversified farming is rapidly being mastered. The climatic conditions are being understood and the future of Oregon is one of the most promising.

No one thinks of Oregon without thinking of its fishing industry, especially the salmon industry, but Oregon also furnishes splendid sea fish, as well as oysters, clams, crabs, etc.

This state is one of the largest producers of sheep in the country, and Oregon wool is recognized as the finest produced in America. An abundance of native forage crops has resulted in a large production of cattle and hogs.

Flax a Profitable Crop.
Oregon flax is another profitable crop, this product being equal to that grown in Ireland and Belgium. Hops is another of the important yields of Oregon, and it is estimated that 50 per cent of the hops raised in the United States is grown here. The productivity of the land is unusual and its state authorities claim that it produces the highest yield of grains and potatoes per acre. Whether or not the exact figures would substantiate this claim, the mere fact that production in this state is so great as to make such a claim plausible insures that its land is among the richest.

Oregon has untold timber in an almost unmeasurable amount, running into the hundreds of billions of board feet, both on private lands and in national forests, national parks and Indian lands.

Water Power Means Much to State.
One of the most important features of Oregon's future lies in the fact that there is available, though undeveloped, approximately one-third of the total water power of the

United States to be found in the Columbia River basin. This fact becomes especially important in view of the recent recommendation of President Wilson, that steps should be taken to conserve and develop and bring into use the wonderful possibilities of this water power.

Millions of Acres Available.
Millions of acres of land that have never known the feel of the plow are waiting for the home-seeker in the great Empire States of the Trans-Missouri West, and in the states that face the Pacific Ocean.

Many of these acres are in the dry-farming sections, many of them can be brought under irrigation ditches. In addition to this "wild" land, there are many acres in these states, now cultivated in large tracts, which with the ever westward pushing of those who seek new lands will, in the next few years, be cut up into smaller farms.

When the tremendous tragedy of the world now being enacted in blood and suffering upon the fair fields of France, comes finally to an end, the longing for the open country will take an even greater hold upon the hearts of mankind. Then this great country in the West should be in position to respond to this longing, should be ready to receive those who will seek its welcome.

Oregon must do its part. Every agency in the state should be directed to this end. In preparation for this day every facility should be used to acquaint those who now are looking for a new home in the West, and every organization that is working to secure the upbuilding of the West should be encouraged.

Union Pacific System On the Job.
One of the most active organizations especially maintained for work of this character, an organization admirably equipped with resources and backed with a thorough knowledge and system, is the Colonization and Industrial Bureau of the Union Pacific System.

This Bureau is under the direction of R. A. Smith, who has had many years' experience in such work. Recently there has been installed on the ground floor of the headquarters building of the Union Pacific Railroad, in Omaha, a most complete and permanent exhibit of the agricultural, horticultural and live stock interests

of the states which are served by the Union Pacific System, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California and Nevada. This exhibit, which was prepared and installed through co-operation with the public authorities in each of these states, is to be maintained and kept constantly renewed by the Union Pacific System as the foundation of the work which it carries on for the purpose of bringing new settlers and home-seekers into the West.

Bureau Has No Land for Sale.
The Colonization & Industrial Bureau has no land to sell, and its only interest in the sale of land by those who have it, is the building up of the territory which it serves. In other words, its interest is in bringing together of the land and those who would make new homes upon the land. For that reason expert agents of this Bureau investigate thoroughly all land that is offered for sale and all land agents. These experts satisfy themselves that the land is suitable for farming, that the climatic conditions are right and that the price at which it is offered is reasonable; next they satisfy themselves that the land agent is honest and reliable. There is no need to fool men in order to get them to settle in the West—the truth is strong enough.

Ads Carried in Eastern Papers.
A very extensive advertising campaign in the Eastern states, the Southern states and the States of the Mississippi Valley enables this Bureau to get in touch with those who want facts about the West, and as soon as its representatives learn what section of the country most appeals to the prospect he is turned over to the trustworthy land agents operating in that section.

These land agents take up the work from there on and the records of the Bureau show that the work has been most successful.

During the last year the advertising by the Union Pacific System reached a circulation of more than five million readers a month. There were received nearly ten thousand inquiries and there are records of 2,482 carloads of household goods moved into and through the various states listed above, during six months of this period.

This does not include those who came into the West without shipping their household goods, and there are many who set out all such property before moving. Neither does it include those who went overland in automobiles and there are many of them, too. So it would seem that here is proof of the effectiveness of the plan worked out by the Union Pacific System.

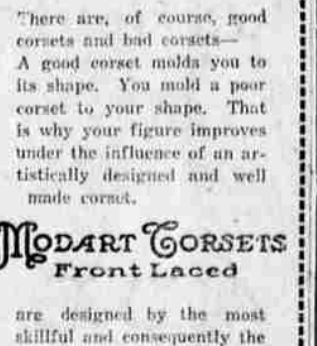
