PATRIOTIC MEETINGS FOR WALLAWA COUNTY—NEW ROAD TO FLORA WILL BE BUILT—BENEFIT RECITAL NETS SUM OF \$55.00.

Enterprise, May 10. (Special)—On account of quarantine regulations occasioned by small pox the Enterprise schools have been dismissed for two weeks. The May term of circuit court has also adjourned until July 25, by order of Judge Knowles. The supply of vaccine was exhausted this week and the physicians wired for more. The recital given for the Red Cross by pupils of Prof. W. A. Henry was well attended. The school orchestra is composed of fifteen violinists who gave most of the program. Merle Cunningham gave a solo. The receipts were \$55 which go to the Junior Red Cross.

A series of demonstrations and patriotic meetings will be held over the county. Miss Minnie Kalbrun of O. A. C. and speakers of prominence will also attend. The meeting scheduled for Enterprise for Saturday had to be called off.

The commencement exercises of the Enterprise school will be held May 23, unless it is found necessary to postpone the same. A class of fourteen will graduate this year. J. A. Burley, a local attorney will give the baccalaureate address. The class decided to save the expense of an outside speaker when just as good a one could be had at home.
