MOST SENSATIONAL WAR PICTURES EVER TAKEN

"THE GERMAN CURSE IN RUSSIA"

(Pathé—Five Reels)

Many pictures of military activities on the Western fronts of Europe have made their way to the screen but "The German Curse in Russia" is the first war film of any importance to show the manner in which warfare in the East is conducted. Surprisingly intimate views of trench life were caught by Donald C. Thompson, who procured the pictures, obviously at great peril to himself. Time and again the scenes show Russian soldiers going "over the top." Not a few fall dead in their tracks, only a handful manage to stumble through the network of barbed wire and secure control of the enemy trenches—but in the end control is theirs.

An interesting section of the five reels is devoted to activities of the women's Battalion of Death, formed by the patriotic daughters of Russia. With cropped hair, men's uniforms, handling guns like veterans, they present a most inspiring and unusual spectacle which doubtless will bring a house down with applause. But the fatal side of war is also presented with no sparing of feelings. Literal piles of mangled dead are shown strewn on the bloody fields of Russia. A more heart-rending sight could not be secured.

Mr. Thompson has titled his scenes "The German Curse in Russia," because of the fact that he aims to show that the defeats

of the Russian army, its lack of supplies and ammunition and the treachery of Lenin and the Bolsheviks are directly due to the vicious propaganda offered by agents of "Germany." Throughout he spells the enemy name with a small g. And Hun is relegated to the small h with the obvious result of instilling patriotism in the mind of the spectator as well as showing educational topical scenes. And for both his efforts Mr. Thompson should receive great credit. With what are probably the most interesting war pictures ever placed on the market, presented in a decidedly pro-American and anti-enemy atmosphere, he is rendering both the individual and the United States a tremendous service.

These pictures will be presented at the Star Theatre on Thursday and Friday.

STATEMENT BY MR. HOFF.

Confident of Nomination for Office of State Treasurer.

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—O. P. Hoff, Labor Commissioner and candidate for State Treasurer is confident of his nomination and election. In a statement issued from his office at Salem, he states that he is receiving the active support of all "workers" because of the workers' confidence in his "ability and honesty to accord them just and equal representation and protection." Also he cites as a reason for the strong support he is receiving from his friends and working people "I help them when I can, meet them on the level and deal with them on the square."

Mr. Hoff says, "My candidacy for State Treasurer is now before the people of Oregon. It is not backed with the power of money or with false statements or empty promises but with a clean record and clean hands. I am making this race upon my honor, ability and experience. My oath of office is my platform, my record which has not been or cannot be assailed by any of my opponents is your guarantee and my experience is your protection."

UNION COUNTY REGISTRATIONS

A Total of 7074, of Which Number 616 Cannot Vote at Primary.

County Clerk McCormack reports that the total registration of voters in Union county is 7074, of which 3582 are Republicans and 2476 are Democrats, and there are 616 otherwise registered who will not vote at the primary election on account of not having a party organization. Of the Republicans 2448 are men and 1684 are women. Those registered as Democrats include 2476 men and 628 women.
