**U. S. TO HONOR ITALY.**

Ally's Entrance Into War Will Be Celebrated May 24.

NEW YORK, May 15.—Telegrams are being sent by Charles E. Hughes today to the Governor of every state and the Mayor of every city asking them to further the celebration of Italy-America day, May 24. President Wilson has consented to act as "first honorary patron."

It is expected that local festivities commemorating the third anniversary of Italy's entry into the war, will be held throughout the country. Every citizen is asked to wear a boutonniere of flowers showing Italy's colors.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Italian prisoners in Austria are subjected to horrible outrages, a dispatch to the Italian Embassy from Rome today says.

"Never before in the history of the civilized world have such outrages been registered," it says. "The whole thing seems to be a systematic effort on the part of Austria to destroy the manhood of Italy. Austria is endeavoring in every possible way to surpass in cruelty and ferocity all of her accomplices."

The dispatch says the Italian prisoners have been tripped and left without food or care if wounded. Most of them die of hunger and of plague.

Tuberculosis is raging, and thousands of consumptives fill the concentration camps. When their condition becomes desperate the prisoners are returned to Italy in exchange for Austrian prisoners, whose condition in Italian camps has improved.

In the last 300 prisoners sent back to Italy from Austria all were suffering from tuberculosis in a very advanced stage, the dispatch declares.

**WOMAN HELD TO BE PRO-HUN**

Formal Charge of Violating Espionage Act Filed.

PORTLAND, May 14.—Ann Blachly, arrested at Klamath Falls, Ore., as an alleged seditionist, is the first woman held in Oregon under the espionage act. Formal complaint charging violation of the espionage law was filed by Assistant United States Attorney Robert R. Rankin.

Utterances of Miss Blachly, reported as a Socialist agitator, so aroused the citizens of Klamath Falls that United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas caused her arrest. Trial of the case will be held in Federal Court in Portland, but the date has not been set.

Ernest Frederick Castrow, 48, German resident of Portland, will be given a hearing before United States Commissioner Drake under the espionage act. He is alleged to have made seditious remarks before men of draft age of the general tenor that Germany is right in the war, must win and will win.

**FOR THE RED CROSS DRIVE**

**DRAMATIC INCIDENT IS TO BE PRESENTED TO PROMOTE THE WAR FUND**

Every possible means of the motion picture industry has been put to work in behalf of the coming Red Cross Drive and the latest announcement from Jesse L. Lasky, chairman of the committee of the National Association of the Motion Picture Industry appointed to co-operate with the American Red Cross organization, issued from his office in the New York headquarters of the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation is to the effect that one of the most appealing two reel features that has ever been produced will be shown in all the theatres in the country, beginning a few weeks before the drive.

The picture will be called "The Spirit of the Red Cross," the scenario of which was written by James Montgomery Flagg, the well known illustrator and produced by Jack Eaton, one of the best known young producers of the country. This truly excellent film is distinctly different from any propaganda material that was ever issued, for it not only smashes its pertinent story most forcibly in its visualized manner, but it has every qualification of a feature, action, heart, interest, suspense and the ultimate justification.

The story of the production centers around Sammy (Ray McKee) an American boy who is called to the front, forced to leave his family and sweetheart (Peggy Adams), she having done preliminary training work at home and scheduled to follow him in a short while. All during Sammy's travels to the battle front he is impressed by the work of the Red Cross which he sees on every side, and is spurred onward to better efforts in his duties by the vision of his sweetheart who he knows is a part of the work of the nation's best of that organization and who is also "doing her bit" over seas.

Called into battle he carries on his work in such a truly soldierly style worthy of the nation's best traditions, but like thousands of others is injured. While lying on the battlefield the vision of his sweetheart appears, awakening just in time to shoot down a Hun who is crawling about the battlefield killing the wounded. Eventually becoming unconscious he is removed to a base hospital and nursed back to life by his own loved one.

A granary of this size can be moved anywhere and can be filled directly from the thresher, doing away with high priced labor handling and sewing sacks.

The boys in the trenches need the sacks for sand bags for the protection of their very lives and perhaps your boy is among them.
