DONOVAN WAS MISQUOTED

PERRY MAN IS LOYAL AND REPORT BELIEVED FRAMED.

Has Been Lumber Grader For Fourteen Years With Grande Ronde Lumber Company.

The report that E. B. Donovan, charged to be disloyal and charged with having made slighting remarks about the boys in France, is a mistake and his accuser, Louie Tanasse, was not only apparently mistaken, but there is some ground for the belief that he had a personal grudge against Donovan, which may have prompted his activity in starting such a report.

The Observer has investigated Mr. Donovan, and finds that he has been a lumber grader at Perry for the Grande Ronde Lumber company, which position he has held for fourteen years. In the altercation between himself and Tanasse the war was not a factor, but was based on other causes. No charges were preferred against Mr. Donovan, as Tanasse said there would be proven lack of foundation for the talk.

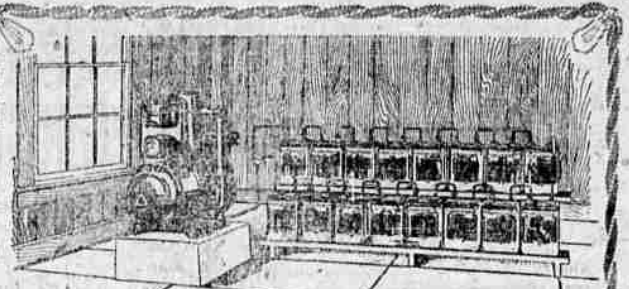
