HOBSON STRIKES AT LIQUOR BUSINESS

(Continued from page one)

His early life was devoted to naval construction and he knows every screw and every bolt that enters into construction of a man-of-war as well as a fishing tug. Many share the regret that he cannot be used at the present time to explain to the people the great naval questions that arise, but his work is bringing results, although it is admitted that he is taking a long way around for the quick action necessary to win the war, if as he says, "it is necessary to make America and her allies dry before the war can be won."

Making a Good One.
Judge J. W. Knowles presided at the Hobson meeting last evening and introduced the speaker who at once went straight into his subject. He told of the evils of the world, of the deep suffering in many quarters and stated in earnest words that it will be a much better place to live in when the last bottle of booze has vanished.

Going into the scientific phase of the liquor question he told how alcohol affects the higher portion of the brain which is the portion that separates man from brute, indicating by scientific tests just what a tremendous bearing even the light drinker has on degenerating society, himself and everything associated with him. Especially did he dwell upon the effect drinking has upon posterity showing that alcohol drinkers soon meet the end of their race and their kind will not reproduce and replenish the earth.

His message to the people on the effect of alcohol on the present war was terse and pointed. He left no room for doubt, according to his argument, but that the nations which abolish liquors entirely and get in harmony with nature and her wonderful rejuvenation of the physical being would win the war. His idea is that the waving of flags and the sending of men by the millions to the battle front will be strengthened at least 50 per cent if all Allies would abolish the rum ration and the wine ration. As a test he told of 100 soldiers of Sweden who were in target practice without liquor. Their score was 30, and immediately following each soldier was given a portion of light beer. Thirty minutes later the same men went out on the same field and shot at the same targets under the same conditions and their score was 4.

He said we are all saving to win the war, yet there is enough grain used in the manufacture of liquors to absorb all the saving made by the people. That transportation is breaking down yet there is enough tonnage used for the transportation of liquors which if abolished would put transportation in a normal state even with the losses of ships and the crippled condition of the railroads.

His talk was forceful, his delivery was good. He is an old-timer at the work and knew exactly what he was doing when he extracted a pledge from the audience for individual work in the great campaign of nationwide prohibition which is now on in earnest.

WHERE THE MONEY GOES

Statement of Distribution of Red Cross Funds.

The American Red Cross, which begins this week a great national campaign for \$100,000,000, has just issued a statement of the condition of its war fund on April 15, 1918.

Up to date the Red Cross had expended for war purposes almost \$100,000,000 and yet had over \$10,000,000 left to spend.

This was because the war fund, with interest, amounted to \$110,143,369.47.

All the balance of \$10,000,000 will have been expended or allotted by June 1.

The report shows that nearly \$31,000,000 was expended in France, and that includes over \$3,000,000 for Red Cross hospital service; nearly \$2,000,000 on Red Cross surgical dressing service; over \$1,500,000 to various hospitals; \$1,600,000 for canteens for American soldiers and for French soldiers; nearly \$3,000,000 for reconstruction of villages; nearly \$3,000,000 for refugees and relief, including the housing of 31,000 families; over \$2,000,000 on prevention of tuberculosis, and much miscellaneous expenditures.

Belgium received over \$2,000,000, principally in general relief; Belgian refugees over \$1,000,000; while \$500,000 was spent for canteen for Belgian soldiers and relief for Belgian children.

Italy received a total of over \$4,500,000, Russia over \$1,200,000; Rumania over \$2,600,000; Serbia \$894,000; Great Britain \$3,260,000, including contribution to the British Red Cross of \$2,146,000, and \$436,000 for defraying the expense of the work it is doing in England in buying supplies for the American Red Cross. Armenia received \$2,400,000; the Canadian Red Cross \$500,000; Palestine \$399,000; Polish children \$200,000; while \$361,664 has been spent for relief of American prisoners in Germany, principally in getting supplies together so they will be ready for the great number of American prisoners expected in that country.

Nearly \$10,000,000 was spent on relief work in the United States, and the army and navy base hospitals received \$111,000; camp service, including sweaters, and the construction of Red Cross Convalescent Home over \$7,000,000; while \$15,000,000 of the national fund is held as working capital for the purchase of supplies in this country.
